The Decennial Census

- The U.S. Constitution mandates a complete count once every 10 years of every person residing in the United States, including both citizens and noncitizens of all ages, races, and ethnic groups.
- The next Census will take place in 2020 and aims to count everyone once, only once, and in the right place.
- A complete and accurate count is vital because the numbers will effect representation, funding, and decision making for the next 10 years.

Why the Census Matters



Representation

- Apportionment of congressional seats between states
- Drawing of congressional and state legislative districts, school districts, voting precincts, etc.
- Enforcement of voting rights and civil rights legislation

Funding

- Distribution of **\$675 billion** in federal funds annually
- Allocation of state funds

Decision Making

- Informs future planning efforts for tribal, federal, state, and local governments
- Influences organizational decisions of businesses and non-profits
- Guides research



Operational Support

- Provide space that can be used for testing, on-boarding, training, etc.
- Provide lists of residential institutions
- Provide lists of shelters, service providers, and transient locations
- Promote temporary job opportunities

Promotional Support

- Form a Complete Count Committee
- Encourage census participation in newsletters, on websites, alert systems, drop-in articles, etc.



Complete Count Committee



- A volunteer committee established by tribal, state, and local governments, and/or community leaders, to increase awareness about the census and motivate residents in the community to respond.

Why Form a CCC?

- Increase the response rate for residents completing their questionnaire through a focused, neighbor-to-neighbor program.
- Utilize the local knowledge, expertise, and influence of each CCC member to design and implement a Census awareness campaign targeted to the community.
- Bring together a cross section of community members whose focus is 2020 Census awareness.

Benefits of a CCC


- Speaks the language of and knows the pulse of the community and will help ensure an accurate 2020 Census count.
- Gains valuable knowledge about the Census process and develops a plan to impart that knowledge on the community.
- Increases participation ratio and response rate by continuing awareness of the 2020 Census.

CCC Subcommittee Types



Dayton-Montgomery County Complete Count Committee

- Initiated by City of Dayton and Montgomery County
- Higher prevalence of hard-to-count populations
- First time the census will be conducted online
- Localize the Census
- Data driven approach
- Enlist trusted voices from cross-section of the community






Dayton-Montgomery County CCC Timeline



 - Resulting statistical areas will be used for 2020 Census, American Community Survey and other censuses and surveys

PSAP Process



- MVRPC is the primary participating organization for Darke, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, and Preble Counties
- Warren County handled by OKI
- Census Bureau establishes criteria for statistical areas
- Opportunity for local governments to review and comment on proposed changes

July 2019

- Delineation phase ends

January 2020

- Verification phase begins


May 2020

Census 2020 Low Response Scores

Low Response Score:

- 30.0 to 49.1 (less likely to respond)
- 25.0 to 29.9
- 20.0 to 24.9
- 16.0 to 19.9
- 0 to 15.9 (more likely to respond)
