Board of Directors Actions and Addressing Racism as a Public Health Emergency

The Miami Valley is a wonderful Region – a great place to live, work, and raise a family. We are blessed with an abundant fresh water supply with our Buried Valley Aquifer. We have beautiful rivers and creeks that bring many rare and endangered species for our residents and visitors to enjoy. We have a high quality of life and low expense compared to other regions. We have outstanding school districts, trade schools, colleges, and universities that educate our many residents. We have a robust faith community with a variety of different styles of worship and beliefs that feed, educate, and inform our belief in a higher power beyond ourselves. We have a strong and growing business community leading in technology, transportation, education, financial services, health care, manufacturing, and other sectors. The Miami Valley also has a history of segregation and racism as documented in our Equity Regional Profile in 2017. From 1910 to 1950, the Federal Housing Authority required covenants forbidding sale of houses to African Americans everywhere except for west Dayton and other specific areas. We know about civil unrest here in Dayton and in the Miami Valley. In the 1960's, Dayton and the Miami Valley hosted numerous marches for civil rights, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. made multiple trips to Dayton, Ohio. Our region also experienced the turbulence of riots as well as "white flight" with many leaving Dayton for suburbs.

In recent months, the nation has seen many highly visible reminders of racism that prick the conscious of citizens and news outlets. The recent murder of George Floyd of Minneapolis by policemen, Ahmaud Arbery by two men in southeast Georgia, or the mistaken killing of Breanna Taylor in Louisville, KY also by police, have prompted peaceful demonstrations nationally, across Ohio and in our local communities in opposition to over policing and the mistreatment of African Americans.

The underlying tenants of racism in our country span many centuries. Our Nation's fledgling economy was heavily dependent on slavery for growth. The passage of Jim Crow laws after slavery was abolished. The struggle for ending racial discrimination through civil rights and voting rights in the 1960's. In the end, there is plenty of evidence that racism has not gone away. Instead, it has become entrenched. By failing to talk about it, we enable the problem of racism to continue from one generation to the next.

In July 2017, MVRPC published the Miami Valley Equity Regional Profile. In October 2017, MVRPC launched the Miami Valley Equity Initiative and in 2019, we launched the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities (ILE). In 2020, we held our first meeting of the Regional Equity Initiative (REI), an initiative that is charged with developing strategies and funding initiatives that reduce racism and increase access to opportunity for all.

In response to the demonstrations and need to encourage progressive policy and institutional change, Boards of Health across the Miami Valley Region, Ohio, and the nation are declaring racism and discrimination a public health crisis. Racism and discrimination impact African American residents by undermining the achievement of the American Dream and inhibiting access to opportunity that everyone should have available to them.

MVRPC's largest government jurisdictions, City of Dayton, Montgomery County, City of Trotwood, City of Piqua, and others have passed or are considering passing resolutions in support of this declaration of racism and discrimination as a public health crisis. Numerous MVRPC associate members have passed resolutions in opposition to racism including University of Dayton, Sinclair College, Greater Dayton Chamber of Commerce, and others.

I urge MVRPC to also take action. Therefore, the staff recommends that the MVRPC Technical Advisory Committee and Board of Directors adopt the attached resolution that encourages removal of discrimination and racism from MVRPC decision making and supports the efforts by our members to declare racism and discrimination as a public health emergency and as such we will take the following actions:

- 1. Denounce discrimination of any group based upon race, income, jurisdiction, ability, national origin, age, sexual preference or gender;
- 2. Support racism as a public health emergency in the Miami Valley Region and authorize the Executive Director to work with the various county health boards to address the health and wellness of all of our residents through removing barriers to opportunity and good health;
- 3. Authorize the Executive Director to develop proactive policies, trainings, and programs that increase a broader understanding of race and diversity among our agency staff, boards, committees, as well as member agencies when appropriate. Members are encouraged to adopt any policies developed to this end;
- 4. Advocate and support the continued active involvement of the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities as our regional and community entity that works to remove racism, increase access to opportunity, and increase livability in our communities of the Miami Valley;
- 5. Continue to support black and minority owned businesses through an aggressive and inclusive purchasing program that ensures fairness and equal opportunity.



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RESOLUTION

Ensuring Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in all MVRPC Staff, Committee, and Board of Directors Actions and Addressing Racism as a Public Health Emergency

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as a Voluntary Association of Local Governments by Ohio Revised Code Section 713.21; and

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Carlisle, Franklin, Springboro, and Franklin Township in Warren County and makes transportation policy and funding decisions; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Board serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the federal transportation planning process and other matters for the Miami Valley Region; and

WHEREAS, the Equity Regional Profile published by the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission in July 2017 found that systemic, institutionalized segregation based upon race and nationalization was implemented by the Federal Housing Authority from 1910 through 1950 through housing covenants to keep African Americans and Immigrants from living in any part of the Miami Valley besides the west side of Dayton; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Board of Directors and its partners formed the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities on September 05, 2019 which set aside funding for staff, programs, and projects that eliminate racism and other disparities, increase access to opportunity, and improve livability for Seniors throughout the Miami Valley; and

WHEREAS, this practice of institutional and systemic segregation and racism has harmed certain west side, central city, and other neighborhoods as better jobs, education, health, and food and housing opportunities have been built in other parts of the Miami Valley and have allowed those who could move to have increased access to opportunity; and

WHEREAS, this historic practice of systemic segregation and racism has had harmful effects on every community in the Miami Valley Region as African Americans and immigrants were discouraged from moving through use of restrictive covenants, local ordinances, or other practices by realtors, banks, title companies, neighbors, and local governments over time; and

WHEREAS, racism causes persistent discrimination and disparate outcomes in many areas of life including housing, economic opportunity, infant mortality, employment, food access, environmental protection, and criminal justice; and an emerging body of research demonstrates that racism itself is a social determinant of health; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC governmental and associate members have adopted antiracism policies including the City of Dayton, Montgomery County, City of Piqua, City of Trotwood, Greater Dayton Chamber of Commerce, University of Dayton, Sinclair College, and others that are considering adopting resolutions. We urge all members to take action in support of ending racism as well as advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's Board of Directors hereby:

- 1. Denounces discrimination of any group or in any form based upon race, income, jurisdiction, ability, national origin, age, sexual preference or gender;
- 2. Declares that Racism is a Public Health Emergency in the Miami Valley Region and authorizes the Executive Director to work with the various county and municipal health boards to address the health and wellness of all of our residents through removing barriers to opportunity and good health:
- 3. Authorizes the Executive Director to develop proactive policies, trainings, and programs that increase a broader understanding of race and diversity among our agency staff, boards, committees, as well as member agencies when appropriate. Members are welcome to utilize any policies developed to this end.
- 4. Advocates and supports the continued active involvement of the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities as our regional and community entity that works to remove racism, increase access to opportunity, and increase livability in our communities of the Miami Valley.
- 5. Continue to support black and minority owned businesses through an aggressive and inclusive purchasing program that ensures fairness and equal opportunity.

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Carlisle, Franklin, Springboro and Franklin Township in Warren County; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning process for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, all Federally funded transit and highway improvements within Greene, Miami and Montgomery County must be included in the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) prior to the expenditure of Federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 7, 2020; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP amendment; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

WHEREAS, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #2** to the <u>SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program</u> as shown on the attached TIP Tables.




There is an intentional focus on equity, launching programs and transforming systems that create a community where people of all ages, races, incomes and abilities can thrive.



Digital Divide / Internet Insecurity Project

- Reliable and affordable high-speed internet access is a necessity for all residents of Montgomery County.
- The COVID-19 pandemic exposed and widened a digital divide long recognized in our communities.
- Montgomery County residents facing internet insecurity are adversely impacted by the education, workforce, and healthcare consequences of the pandemic.
- Without high-speed internet access, students can not connect to remote learning, employment that requires working from home is not possible, and telehealth services are not available.

Digital Divide / Internet Insecurity Project

- MVRPC convened a Digital Divide / Internet Insecurity Work Group that meets weekly, with representatives from Montgomery County, MVRPC, MCESC, Learn 2 Earn, The Dayton Foundation, MVECA, MVCC, Dayton Metro Library, and the City of Dayton.
- MCESC collected data from all public school districts in Montgomery County on internet insecurity for their students.
- The MVRPC team mapped this data and data on provider availability throughout the Region in order to facilitate the analysis of potential solutions. MVECA offered expertise in the areas of connectivity strategy, provider options and pricing.




The MVRPC team used data that the MCESC gathered from all public school districts in Montgomery County.

Each dot indicates a household without reliable, affordable internet access for remote learning.

In all, there are approximately 3,800 households when non-public school estimates are added to this data.

The shaded areas reveal the highest concentrations of disconnected households.

speeds of 10 MBPS upload and 1 MBPS download which includes satellite, DSL, fiber and cable based internet providers The entire area offers satellite services, where areas with only provider reflect the only service available is satellite based. The MVRPC team used data to identify the number of internet providers throughout Montgomery County.

Providers mapped include satellite, DSL, fiber and cable based internet service with speeds of at least 10 MBPS/1MBPS necessary for reliable access.

The lightest shading indicates the fewest number of available providers, the darkest shading indicated the most options.

Near term:

Secured \$1.2M in funding from Montgomery County CARES Act Education allotment to provide reliable internet access for approximately 3800 students in Montgomery County do not currently have access to remote learning. Funding will allow MCESC to contract for residential services from various providers which will allow students to learn without having to walk, find transportation or congregate in common areas for shared access.

Long term:

Investment in fiber and broadband networks to all areas of our Region to provide equitable access to reliable and affordable residential internet services.

MVRPC Welcomes Carlton Eley as the new Regional Equity Manager



Carlton Eley is an accomplished expert on the topic of equitable development. Carlton is a former civil servant whose career with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) spanned twenty years. At EPA, he created and managed a portfolio on equitable development for thirteen years, and he was the first urban planner hired by EPA's Office of Environmental Justice.

Carlton is credited for elevating equitable development to the level of formal recognition within U.S. EPA as an approach for encouraging sustainable communities. He was appointed by the President of the American Planning Association (APA) to serve as Chair of the Social Equity Task Force. Also, he re-energized APA's focus on social equity by publishing a Planning Advisory Service Memo in March 2017 that was release to APA's 45,000 members.

He has managed national workshops; coordinated national recognition programs; conducted community technical assistance; and published multiple articles that explore the intersection of equity and community planning. Carlton nominated State Representative Harold Mitchell, Jr. and the ReGenesis Project for the 2015 National Planning Excellence Award for Advancing Diversity and Social Change (in Honor of Paul Davidoff).

In 2003, Carlton participated in the Ian Axford (New Zealand) Fellowship in Public Policy. Following the fellowship, he wrote a chapter on Wellington, New Zealand for the book, Local Sustainable Urban Development in a Globalized World. Carlton has served on community advisory service teams for Pamlico County, NC; Princeville, NC; Gary, IN; Birmingham, AL; and the Vecht River Valley in the Netherlands. His technical assistance work, professional writing, and public engagement efforts have earned citations from the American Planning Association; the National Organization of Minority Architects; and former U.S. Representative Julia Carson.

Since 2005, Carlton has offered numerous lectures on equitable development, including presentations in New Zealand; British Columbia; and the United Arab Emirates. Carlton has a B.A. in Sociology/Social Work Curriculum from Elizabeth City State University and a M.S. in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Iowa.

As Regional Equity Initiative Manager, Carlton will lead equity initiatives agency-wide and in collaboration with our members and strategic partners. He will also serve as the Agency's Title VI leader and expert diversity, inclusion and equity administrator. Carlton will be responsible for complex projects related to social justice and systemic inequities focused on revision of policies and transformation of systems.

Electric Vehicle Charging Station Funding

Ohio EPA <u>recently opened applications</u> for funding Level 2 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations under the VW settlement Fund. Jurisdictions in Greene, Montgomery, and Warren Counties are eligible to receive 100%reimbursement for new charging sites up to \$7,500 per port. There are a number of eligibility requirements for such projects, but the main criteria are that the proposed site be publicly available at least 16 hours per day and not be used for employee or fleet vehicle charging. Sites with nearby amenities, including libraries, shopping or food services, will be more competitive. For the three counties there is a total of \$345,000 available for such projects through this program; we want to make sure Ohio EPA gets enough applications to spend those dollars in our Region.

MVRPC is an eligible applicant and we are interested in working with members to develop a regional application for project sites at your administration buildings, rec centers and other publicly owned properties. We recognize there may be interest but not sufficient staff time to develop individual applications across the region. MVRPC staff will work with member staff to coordinate site visits with representatives of Dayton Power & Light and EV equipment installers to develop qualified estimates for your projects. Current and Upcoming Opportunities for Public Involvement

MVRPC will promote several opportunities in the coming weeks for the public to provide feedback as we develop transportation and transit plans for our Region. Though each plan is unique to its respective focus area, together they will help to shape the way those who live and work in the Miami Valley will travel throughout our Region for decades to come.

Greater Region Transportation Coordination Plan

The *Greater Region Mobility Initiative (GRMI)* is an effort led by the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) in cooperation with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Office of Transit.

The purpose of the GRMI is to improve coordination among transit providers to enhance options for non-drivers within the eight counties of Champaign, Miami, Clark, Montgomery, Darke, Preble, Greene and Shelby. MVRPC acts as the Regional Coordinating Agency (RCA) on behalf of ODOT, to provide these counties the opportunity to participate in this regional approach and support their efforts to expand and enhance transit services within their communities.

Greater Miami Valley Region Transportation Coordination Plan identifies community transportation resources, compiles statistics of the target population, identifies transportation needs and outlines strategies to fill in the gaps and reduce duplications in service.

The REVISED FINAL DRAFT of the Greater Miami Valley Region Transportation Plan will be available for review and comment beginning August 3, 2020. In lieu of an in-person public meeting, all documents are available for public review and comments on www.mvrpc.org/grmi. Comments on the plan will be accepted through September 2, 2020.

2050 Long Range Transportation Plan Update

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) will hold a virtual Public Participation Meeting regarding the **2050 Long Range Transportation Plan Update**. The Long Range Transportation Plan is a long-range (20+ year) strategy and capital improvement program developed to guide the effective investment of public funds in multi-modal transportation facilities. The Plan is updated every five years and is prepared by MVRPC in cooperation with local and state officials, and other coordinating agencies.
