The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hosted the Regional Equity Initiative Sub-Committee meeting on August 26, 2025 at 11:00 a.m. at The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission and via Zoom Video Conference.

I. WELCOME & INTRODUCTIONS

Chairperson Rap Hankins called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m. Self-introductions were made.

II. THE COMMUNITY-FIRST ENERGY PLAN AS THE COMPREHENSIVE CLIMATE ACTION PLAN FOR THE MIAMI VALLEY

Mr. Lindsay presented the Community-First Energy Plan, developed under the U.S. EPA's Climate Pollution Reduction Grant, outlining a regional strategy to cut climate pollution, strengthen resilience, improve public health, and create jobs. He emphasized collaboration among governments, businesses, and residents to expand renewable energy, boost energy efficiency, and promote cleaner transportation. Mr. Lindsay highlighted the region's strong legacy of environmental leadership and called the plan the next major investment in a sustainable future for the Miami Valley.

Mr. Lindsay explained that the plan is built on two years of technical analysis and public engagement, identifying key pathways to reduce emissions beyond "business as usual." Mr. Lindsay noted that commercial buildings, housing, and transportation account for about 80% of local emissions, with the majority of reductions expected from renewable electricity and energy efficiency improvements. He emphasized that while the plan does not achieve net-zero emissions by 2050, Mr. Lindsay stated it positions the region to meet or exceed national targets for 2030 and 2035, create over 100,000 person-years of employment, reduce household energy costs, and cut fine particulate air pollution by

70%. Mr. Lindsay highlighted that the Community-First Energy Plan includes over 30 recommended implementation programs organized into six “Big Moves”: Affordable & Sustainable Buildings, Clean Transportation for All, Clean Energy, Re-Energized & Clean Industrial Sectors, Circular Economy, and Leadership & Democracy. He further reported that a 30-day public comment period and virtual meeting were held, and Mr. Lindsay concluded that the final plan now stands as a comprehensive climate action plan for the Miami Valley region.

III. FY26 PROGRAM FOCUS

Mr. Juin provided an overview of current priorities and initiatives for the Institute for Livable & Equitable Communities. He began by outlining the Institute’s three primary focus domains for the fiscal year: Transportation, Technology & Connectivity, and Health & Environment. Transportation remains the Institute’s most direct area of influence, while Technology & Connectivity has been identified as a growing regional need without a current lead organization. The Health & Environment domain aligns closely with existing internal initiatives and builds on the Institute’s history with the Environmental Justice Academy. Proposed co-leads for these domains include the Greater Dayton Regional Transit Authority and Drive Electric Dayton for Transportation; the Miami Valley Communications Council and Dayton Metro Libraries for Technology & Connectivity; and the Environmental Justice Academy for Health & Environment. Mr. Juin emphasized that while these domains will remain priorities throughout the fiscal year, they will continue to evolve based on agency capacity, regional needs, and input from Institute leaders and contributors. The Institute is also seeking qualified organizations and subject-matter experts to serve as domain co-leads, with the goal of expanding regional collaboration and impact.

Mr. Juin also reported on progress from the Data & Metrics workgroup, which has been meeting regularly to establish a framework for improving regional livability and reducing equity disparities, particularly among vulnerable populations. This work will continue to align with interagency strategic planning and guidance from Institute leaders.

Regarding collaborative funding, Mr. Juin reiterated the goal of securing the Institute’s first non-local, non-government award. Current opportunities being evaluated include the Rural and Municipal Utility Advances Cybersecurity Grant, the NEH Humanities Research Centers on Artificial Intelligence program, the U.S. DOT All Stations Accessibility Program, and the Growing Justice Grants initiative.

Lastly, Mr. Juin discussed efforts to align the Age-Friendly Initiative with the Regional Equity Initiative, noting that the Institute is advancing concrete steps to connect these programs and promote a more integrated, equitable approach to regional livability.

IV. HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH & THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

Ms. Christina Mendez, Executive Director of the Dayton Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, provided an update on events and activities in the Miami Valley celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month. She noted that access to Spanish-translated materials remains extremely limited in the Dayton region, despite Spanish being the second most commonly spoken language in the United States. To kick off Hispanic Heritage Month, a concert will be held at the Levitt Pavilion on September 6th, followed by PACO at Riverscape on September 20th. Ms. Mendez also noted that two Hispanic festivals previously planned in Springfield and Middletown have been cancelled.

V. SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIR & MEMBER UPDATES

Several subcommittee members provided updates on events and activities taking place around the Miami Valley. Peter Benkendorf announced that the first annual Dayton River Roots Festival will be held on October 4th. Julio Mateo shared information about the Dayton Democracy Summit, which will take place on October 27th at Sinclair and is hosted by the Kettering Foundation. Stephanie Van Hoose reported on the upcoming REACH Festival in November, noting that Wright State University will no longer be hosting the event. Brian Martin informed the group that Fabrice Juin is in the process of obtaining his 5307 Transit Planner Certification. Finally, Rap Hankins announced that Drive Electric Dayton has received approval to become the Electric Vehicle Association of Ohio.

VI. ACTION ITEMS, FOLLOW-UP, & NEXT MEETING

A survey will be sent out in the next REI Update for subcommittee members to choose a new meeting time. Lunch will no longer be provided and the meeting time will be shortened.

VII. CLOSING REMARKS

Chairperson Rap Hankins adjourned the meeting at 1:00 p.m.

Program Manager's Report: Recent Funding Awards

Transitional Funding (The Dayton Foundation)

- Since 2019, The Dayton Foundation has helped convene and co-fund the Institute for Livable & Equitable Communities contributing \$750,000 over this time.
- The Dayton Foundation recently added \$75,000 to this original contribution, to assist with the financial transition of the Institute; directed to fund and support work to better align the Regional Equity Initiative and the Miami Valley Age-Friendly Network.

Great Lakes Thriving Communities Grantmaking Program (Minneapolis Foundation via US EPA)

- The program's goal is to lift up community-led innovation and strengthen community-based groups towards environmental and public health efforts in underserved communities.
- \$150,000 via Tier 1: Assessment & Engagement; to increase understanding of local environmental and public health issues.
- In partnership with the Westwood Right Project.

- The Greater Region Mobility Alliance is a group of public, private, and non-profit transportation providers and seniors and individuals with disabilities who work together to solve gaps in transportation services within an 8-county area.




