








Outcome and Output



MVRPC Welcomes Del Mar Fellow – Leigh Sempeles





2020 Network Age Friendly States & Communities Survey


Who serves as the lead organization to coordinate age-friendly work?

ODOT made available \$100,000 to Region 2 for regional level projects



- Project addresses regional plan Goal 1 of the GRMI: Enhance Regional Coordination
- Project will review all public & private transportation providers and compare with needs, intent to establish centralized scheduling hub for services across the region

Project Development/Selection



- ✓ Clark County TCC was identified as Lead Agency
 - ✓ Project was advertised with bids received in Jul 2021
 - ✓ Bid award: Stantec Consulting Services under review
 - ☐ Anticipate to enter into contract late summer/early fall 2021
- ☐ Project will be completed no later than May 31, 2022

- Average Daily Thefts 80/day
- Average Cost to Replace \$1,500-\$2,200

Low cost preventative measures:

- Signs
- Motion sensor lighting
- Leaving on office lights
- Protective parts (see right)
- Partnerships (shared lots)
- Etc.
