The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors met on May 6, 2021 at 9:00 a.m. via Zoom Video Conference (<u>https://02web.zoom.us/j/87647642836</u>). All members and news media were notified of the meeting pursuant to the Sunshine Law.

I. INTRODUCTIONS

Chairperson Mucher called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Ms. Lombardelli did a roll call by jurisdiction. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by Chairperson Mucher.

II. APPROVAL OF APRIL 1, 2021 MEETING MINUTES

Ms. Lommatzsch made a motion to approve the minutes from the April 1, 2021 Board meeting. Mr. Gorman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON ACTION ITEMS

None

IV. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Recommended Approval of MVRPC TRAC Projects for CY2021

Mr. Daniel presented MVRPC's recommended Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) projects for CY2021. MVRPC staff has completed its review of the three TRAC projects submitted this year and will meet with the project sponsors to come to a final concurrence of the final projects. The projects listed were GRE-35-5.84 US 35 Valley/Trebein Interchange, I-675/Wilmington Pike Interchange Project, and North Dixie Drive/Northwoods Blvd/Lightner Road Improvements.

Mr. Daniel opened the floor for questions and comments. Mr. Koogler announced Greene County Commissioners have added \$6.4 million towards the GRE-35-5.84 US 35 Valley/Trebein Interchange project to match funds for TRAC approval. Mr. Martin noted they are scheduled to meet with the TRAC on May 6, 2021 and will acknowledge the Greene County Commissioner's efforts in his remarks.

Mr. Daniel stated that MVRPC staff recommends approving the resolution.

Mr. Koogler made a motion to approve the resolution to approve the MVRPC Priorities for Major New Capacity Projects for CY2021. Ms. Wallace seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Adoption of the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan Update and Summary of Public Participation Meeting (April 14, 2021)

Ms. Ramirez presented on the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan and summary of the public participation meeting. She provided information regarding the public meeting on April 14th and the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan including new initiatives such as; CAV scenarios, the project evaluation system, performance management, congestion management projects (roadway, transit and alternative modes), and air quality-transportation conformity. Ms. Ramirez stated that MVRPC staff and TAC recommend adoption.

Ms. Ramirez opened the floor to questions and comments. Mr. Mucher noted Ms. Ramirez provided an excellent summary on the Long Range Plan and made the comment that based on the amount of Greene County projects included in the plan, it reflects the influence that Greene County has on our organization and the strength of the County.

Mr. Simmons made a motion to approve the resolution to adopt the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan. Ms. Godsey seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

C. Approval of the SFY2022 Budget and Work Program

Ms. Keels summarized the SFY2022 Budget and Work Program and highlighted the following updates:

- Request \$5.1 million Expenditure and Revenue Budget for 2022
- Personnel changes, salary pay grades and new position additions
- Member dues in anticipation of the release of the 2020 census data
- MVRPC Capital Budget
- Work Program narrative update
- Transportation Planning Program Revenue Budget
- Title VI Compliance Questionnaire

Ms. Keels stated that staff recommends adoption of the SFY 2022 Budget and Work Program.

Ms. Keels opened the floor for questions and discussed reviewing the salary schedule, and census data impacts on MVRPC.

Mr. Bruns made a motion to approve the resolution to adopt the MVRPC State Fiscal Year 2022 budget including resources, expenditures and staffing; establishing the preliminary Calendar Year 2022 MVRPC Membership Assessment Rate; and adopting the MVRPC State Fiscal Year 2022 Work Program Budget and Work Program. Mr. Gorman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

D. Approval of MVRPC Constitution and Bylaws Amendments

Ms. Keels presented a proposed amendment to the MVRPC Constitution and Bylaws after reviewing with legal counsel.

Ms. Godsey asked that the definition of quorum for the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities Steering Committee (ISC) be defined as one third of the voting members of the committee.

Ms. Keels opened the floor for questions.

Mr. Serr made a motion to approve the resolution to adopt the proposed amendments to MVRPC Constitution and Bylaws with the amendment to the definition of a quorum as stated by Ms. Godsey. Ms. Godsey seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

V. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Going Places Progress Update

Mr. Kim presented an update to the Going Places Implementation Tools.

Mr. Kim noted that today's briefing covers 3 implementation tools: Regional Geographic Information System (GIS), targeted subgroups to address specific issues of local jurisdiction coordination, and innovative solutions for sustainable development and redevelopment.

Mr. Kim shared the progress being made with the Montgomery County Land Bank Thriving Neighborhood Initiative and provided information about PLAN4Health-Miami Valley: A Planning for Health Initiative.

Mr. Kim opened the floor for questions and addressed working towards establishing partnerships with the hospitals.

A. Executive Director's Update

Mr. Martin reviewed the May ED's Update:

Mr. Martin mentioned discussions with Darke County about rejoining MVRPC and their interest in working with MVRPC to develop a county plan. Mr. Martin also mentioned his briefing with the Preble County Commissioners on the RTPO (Regional Transportation Planning Organization) and the upcoming meetings with Shelby County and the City of Sidney regarding the RTPO. The RTPO would include Darke, Preble and Shelby counties.

Mr. Martin announced August will be the first Board hybrid meeting. Information on the procedures and processes will be sent out next month. MVRPC staff are working towards creating a safe environment for everyone.

Orientation for new members will start in the fall and opportunities to attend will be in September, October and, November. More information will be sent out.

Ms. Godsey inquired about a survey conducted regarding Board member vaccinations in support of the Montgomery County Health Department. Mr. Martin answered it would be worthwhile for those who want to participate.

RESOLUTION AMENDING THE SFY2021-SFY2024 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Carlisle, Franklin, Springboro and Franklin Township in Warren County; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning process for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, all Federally funded transit and highway improvements within Greene, Miami and Montgomery County must be included in the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) prior to the expenditure of Federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 7, 2020; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP amendment; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

WHEREAS, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #10** to the <u>SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation</u> <u>Improvement Program</u> as shown on the attached TIP Tables.

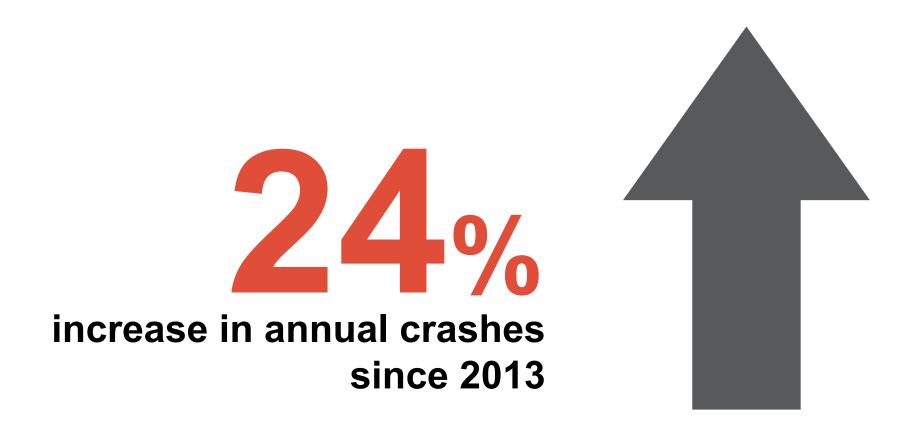














Crashes per Year



Region vs Ohio vs U.S.


Crash Rate (per Million Vehicle Miles Travelled)



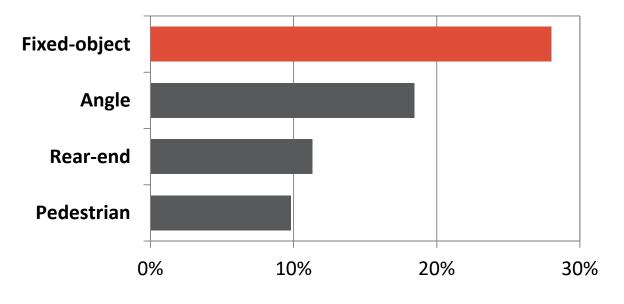





MVRPC analyzes crash data to help improve transportation safety and inform the planning process. These analyses are the first steps towards understanding road safety conditions in the Dayton Region. A number of statistical and comparative analyses are performed on the regional crash data, which is collected from Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS) in three-year intervals. Reports below outline crash trends and a list of high-crash locations is generated, which identifies roadways that may need further examination to determine need for improvement.

SFY 2021 REGIONAL ROADWAY SAFETY UPDATE

The latest analysis used data of crashes reported during the years 2017 through 2019. The reports below outline safety conditions on the regional roadway network and identify high-crash locations from those three years.

SUMMARY OF CRASHES FROM 2017 TO 2019

Several trends were revealed in the <u>analysis of crashes</u> that occurred on regional roadway network from the years 2017 to 2019. An overview and detailed report are available.

HIGH-CRASH LOCATIONS

In the <u>SFY 2021 High Crash Location Analysis</u>, intersections and roadway segments were ranked based on the frequency and severity of crashes. These high-crash locations were prioritized as low, medium, and high priority, which include 162 intersections and 222 segments. These priority high-crash locations are displayed in maps below, and the top 100 are listed.

PEDESTRIAN CRASH RISK ASSESSMENT STUDY

The <u>Pedestrian Crash Risk Assessment Study</u> is a systemic safety analysis commissioned by ODOT to identify risk for pedestrian crashes on intersections and segments (arterials and collectors) on the regional road network. Using a variety of data impacting pedestrian crashes, risk factors were used to identify the priority network — locations where conditions exist for pedestrian crashes to occur on arterial and collector facilities for both intersections and segments. The priority network can be viewed on the embedded map.

SAFETY RESOURCES

Many programs and resources are available to communities in the Miami Valley to advance multi-modal roadway safety priorities. In SFY 20**60** MVRPC has compiled a list of such <u>safety resources</u> that includes informational sources

- A systemic safety analysis was commissioned by ODOT, following FHWA's Systemic Safety Project Selection Tool (SSPST) framework, to identify risk for pedestrian crashes on network intersections and segments (arterials and collectors) in ODOT District 8 counties including Greene and Warren counties as a pilot. Miami and Montgomery counties in District 7 were later added.
- Using a variety of data impacting pedestrian crashes, risk factors were used to identify locations where conditions exist for pedestrian crashes on arterial and collector facilities on the road network for both intersections and segments.
- Locations were rated 0 to 10 and plotted on a map based on an overrepresentation of risk factors (the higher the number of risk factors, the higher the risk for pedestrian crashes).



MVRPC and ODOT Explore Creation of RTPO for Darke, Preble and Shelby Counties

MVRPC has initiated meetings with Darke, Preble and Shelby Counties to form a Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO). The RTPO would bring considerable planning services to our nonMPO members like Preble County. ODOT currently funds six RTPOs across the state using their Statewide Planning and Research federal funds and

As with Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), RTPOs include policy and technical boards, prepare and adopt long range transportation plans, assemble transportation improvement programs, and identify crash locations. They also identify projects and programs that improve travel. Membership of the RTPO committees will include ODOT, county, municipal, township, transit mobility managers, transit agencies, park districts, bicycling and other interests from the three counties. The information gathered will be further enhanced by its proximity to the MPO. If we are successful, all entities involved would become MVRPC members as well as members of the RTPO.

MVRPC staff has met with Preble County Commission, Darke County Commission, Darke County Economic Development, Shelby County Commission, and we plan to meet with the city of Sidney on June 14th. Thus far, all have been receptive to the plan and are waiting on the final details before committing.

Darke County Commission has been an impetus to forming the RTPO and plan to vote at their next meeting to approve Darke County and 8 additional

jurisdictions within Darke County to join MVRPC. Through the efforts of current MVRPC Board Alternate for Versailles, Village Administrator Mike Busse was key in gaining support for Darke County joining MVRPC and forming the RTPO. While it isn't final yet, we are hopeful that the RTPO would begin during the FY 2023 Fiscal Year (July 1, 2022).

Miami Valley Cycling Summit Featured Keynote Presentation on Active Transportation Equity

MVRPC was proud to sponsor the 2021 Miami Valley Cycling Summit held virtually in early May. The event featured a compelling and informative keynote presentation by Charles T. Brown, MPA, CPD, LCI. Mr. Brown is the founder and managing principal of Equitable Cities LLC—a nationally known urban planning, policy, research and multimedia firm working at the intersection of transportation health, and equity. He serves as a senior researcher with the Alan M. Voorhees Transportation Center (VTC) and adjunct professor at the Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy, both at Rutgers University.

Mr. Brown stressed the importance of health in all policies, health equity, and transportation equity in his presentation. He shared practical ways that communities can create safe, healthy, and livable communities. He presented his research on the barriers to biking and walking for women and minorities; analyzing the impact of crime on walking frequency and propensity; centering and prioritizing equity in transportation planning and decision-making; and analyzing barriers to accessing parks and open spaces.

Owners of residential properties in the Miami Valley that were impacted by the tornadoes now can visit <u>http://www.retreet.org/mvtc</u> to complete a simple online form to request that free, native trees be planted for them. Representatives of RETREET and its partners will work with those who submit requests to determine the best planting locations at each home site.

The trees will be planted by volunteers during events held throughout the next two years. Events will occur during optimal planting seasons, and are currently planned to follow the path of the tornadoes moving west to east, with the first planting events taking place in Trotwood, Brookville, Perry Township, and Clayton this fall.

All owners of tornado impacted properties, regardless of where they live along the path of the storm, can complete their tree requests now. Representatives from RETREET will contact property owners as the planting events near for each community.

These trees, which will serve as powerful symbols of hope, also will reestablish the environmental identity of the Miami Valley, providing shade, energy savings, and a myriad of other environmental and economic benefits for residents, as well as habitat for wildlife. The Miami Valley TREEcovery Campaign will be a major environmental and infrastructural investment that will leave a legacy for generations to come.

Miami County

• I-75 southbound entrance ramp from S.R. 41 southbound will be closed, Tuesday, June 29 and Wednesday, June 30 Detour: SR-41 to I-75 NB take CR-25A (Exit 78) turn left onto CR-25A. Turn left onto I-75 southbound

Montgomery County

• I-75 Bridges over Edwin C. Moses Boulevard and Carillon Boulevard will be under construction. I-75 will experience a traffic pattern shift, ramp closures and lane restrictions in each direction. Estimated completion: Fall 2022. The Edwin C. Moses Boulevard entrance ramp to I-75 southbound will close through Friday, October 15, 2021.

- Interstate 75 Bridge Repairs Expect a traffic pattern shift on I-75 northbound between Albany Street and State Route 741 (Springboro Pike). I-75 southbound will experience nightly lane width restrictions, between Albany Street and S.R. 741, through Sunday, August 22.
- U.S. 35 to Interstate 75 Ramp Repairs Construction to replace both U.S. 35 ramps to I-75 Southbound. Estimated completion: Summer 2021.



SUBJECT: Formation of the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities Steering Committee (ISC)

The MVRPC Executive Committee request resumes from current Board delegates and alternates that wish to serve on the 2021 Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities Steering Committee (ISC).

In accordance with the Bylaws adopted by the Board on May 6, 2021:

- The Executive Committee will determine the initial members of the ISC with approval by the Board of Directors.
- The total number of voting members of the ISC shall be thirteen (13) with not more than 3 Institute funders.
- Members of the ISC will be diverse and will include representatives from MVRPC member organizations or Institute funders who align with the Institute domains, and will include grassroots community leaders.
- The ISC shall meet at least quarterly and provide summary reports to the MVRPC Board of Directors on a quarterly basis with a formal presentation no less than annually.
- Each member is appointed for a term of one year and may be re-appointed annually, Chairpersons serve two (2) year terms. Terms are effective with annual membership on January 1st.
- The ISC officers shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and Secretary. The Chairperson will be
 a member of the MVRPC Board of Directors. The Chairperson of the ISC shall appoint annually at the
 January meeting a nominating committee to recommend a slate of candidates to serve as the ViceChairperson and Secretary from among members of the ISC. Members of the ISC shall vote on the slate
 of candidates annually at their April meeting.
- The initial ISC Chairperson shall be appointed by the Executive Committee as recommended by the nomination committee.
- The initial ISC Committee will serve from August 2021 till March 2022
