#### I. INTRODUCTION

Chair, Paul Huelskamp called the meeting to order. Self-introductions were made.

#### II. **APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY 21, 2019 MEETING MINUTES**

Mr. Conway made a motion to approve minutes. Mr. Hammes seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#### IV. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

# A. Recommended Adoption of Amendment to MVRPC's SFY2018-2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to the 15<sup>th</sup> amendment to the SFY 2018-2021 TIP and the numerous changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He referred to the packet showing the tables broken down by county, as well as the statewide line item project tables. Mr. Arnold stated that staff recommends adoption of this TIP amendment and referred to a resolution on page 15 of the mailout.

Mr. Hankins made a motion to recommend adoption. Mr. Conway seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### V. INFORMATION ITEMS

#### A. Resurfacing Program Update

Mr. Arnold stated that MVRPC will have STP funds available for simple resurfacing projects. Mr. Arnold reminded everyone that these funds are not available every year, however MVRPC anticipates that in total, approximately \$3 million will be available this year for these projects. Each project will be eligible for up to \$500,000. Mr. Arnold stated that ADA ramps cannot be included in these projects and that all ADA ramp work must be completed prior to submitting the application.

#### B. Going Places Progress Update

Mr. Kim gave a presentation on the progress of the Going Places Implementation Tools. Mr. Kim stated that there are 3 categories for the 11 implementation tools: Supporting Local Planning; Regional GIS; and Regional Data & Profiles. Mr. Kim stated that today's briefing covers Regional GIS and Regional Arts and Culture Profile.

Mr. Kim stated that a survey of members showed that there was great interest in GIS web mapping. Mr. Kim reviewed that the GIS Mapping Application is accessible via desk top, tablet, and smart phone, and explained that the GIS Mapping Application bundles a variety of data set in a single application that may be viewed in one place. These applications provide maps and data that can be shared internally and with citizens of the community.

Mr. Kim then gave an update on Tool D, Regional Assets and Economic Analyses. Mr. Kim stated that Regional Profiles show where the Region stands on a variety of subjects. Each profile consists of data analysis and information through a print version and dynamic, web-based infographics and interactive maps. Mr. Kim reviewed the most recent profile on Arts and Culture, which covers Arts and Culture Assets, Arts Vibrancy, and Economic Impact in our Region. Mr. Kim shared highlights of the Arts and Culture profile, stating that the Miami Valley has a rich arts and cultural heritage dating back to the 1800's that lives on today. The Region is home to a diverse range of arts and culture experiences that attract visitors and enhance quality of life for our Region's residents.

#### VI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Martin reviewed the April 4<sup>th</sup> Executive Director Update.

Mr. Martin stated that Dr. Marchbanks will be the keynote speaker at MVRPC's Annual Spring Dinner this evening.

Mr. Martin announced that since the completion of the ED update, MVRPC was awarded the Local Public Agency of the Year award from ODOT. He also announced that Dayton's own Regional Transit was honored with the Transit Systems of the year award.

Mr. Martin reminded everyone of the PSAP workshop following the TAC meeting and mentioned the importance of the upcoming 2020 Census.

Mr. Martin thanked everyone for their support during these last few months and stated he is glad to be back.

Subject: Amendment to the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan for Rural Sanitary Sewer

The purpose of this memo is to provide background information to the MVRPC Technical Advisory Committee and Board of Directors on two separate pending Facility Planning Area (FPA) updates. Both updates have their origins in projects to construct new sanitary sewer in small rural villages that heretofore have been served by Household Sewage Treatment Systems (HSTS) or "septic systems." Both projects have reached the stage of applying for an Ohio EPA permit to install for sanitary sewer.

#### Palestine-Hollansburg Joint Sewer District (PHJSD)

In December of 2018 the PHJSD applied to Ohio EPA for a permit to install new sanitary sewer collection and treatment systems. The Palestine-Hollansburg Joint Sewer District (PHJSD) proposes to construct and operate a new sanitary sewer collection and treatment system to serve the Village of Palestine (Liberty Township, Darke County) and the Village of Hollansburg (Harrison Township, Darke County). By contract with the Darke County Commission, this proposed system will also serve an unincorporated area, Glen Karn. The area of this service has no current designated Facility Planning Area (FPA). This minor amendment proposes to create a new FPA matching exactly the service area of the PHJSD – i.e. the corporate boundaries of the two villages. Map 2019-A depicts the proposed boundaries for the proposed Palestine-Hollansburg FPA.

Comments on this proposed new Planning Area were accepted through Monday, May 13, 2019. A total of five comments were received and all were supporting the new FPA and its boundaries.

#### Village of West Milton and Village of Ludlow Falls

In March of 2019 the Village of West Milton applied to Ohio EPA for permit to install for new sanitary sewer. The Village of West Milton proposes to construct and operate a sanitary sewer collection system to serve the Village of Ludlow Falls (Union Township, Miami County), with treatment to occur at the existing West Milton WWTP. Current Facility Planning Area (FPA) boundaries in Union Township group Ludlow Falls with the Villages of Laura and Potsdam, rather than West Milton. This proposed amendment would expand the West Milton FPA to include the Village of Ludlow Falls, as well as additional areas of Union and Newton Townships based on topographical slope and soils/bedrock conditions. The proposed addition would almost double the size of the West Milton FPA, adding just over 8 square miles. Map 2019-B displays the current FPA in Union Township. Map 2019-C depicts the proposed changes to FPA as proposed by the Village of West Milton.

Comments on these proposed boundary updates were accepted through Monday, May 13, 2019. A total of four comments were received and all were supportive or neutral.







## Map 2019-B - Current Southwest Miami County Facility Planning Areas




## Map 2019-C - Proposed Southwest Miami County FPA Updates











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#### RESOLUTION AMENDING THE AREAWIDE WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR NEW RURAL SANITARY SEWER SYSTEMS

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is the Designated Planning Agency (DPA) for Water Quality Management Planning within the Miami Valley Region pursuant to Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 (P.L. 92-500) and 1977 (P.L. 95-217); and

WHEREAS, in fulfillment of its responsibilities as the DPA, MVRPC has prepared the 208 Areawide Water Quality Management Plan, and administers said Plan within its designated five-county water planning jurisdiction, including Greene, Montgomery, Miami, Preble, and Darke Counties, Ohio; and

WHEREAS, it is periodically necessary to amend said Plan to incorporate pertinent and appropriate modifications; and

WHEREAS, proposed new rural sanitary sewer systems to serve the Villages of Hollansburg, Ludlow Falls, and Palestine necessitate the creation of one new Facility Planning Area and the modification of two other Facility Planning Areas; and

WHEREAS, the following amendment, herein known as the 2019 Amendment, has been proposed for the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan:

- 1. New Facility Planning Area for the Villages of Palestine and Hollansburg in Darke County
- 2. Updates to Facility Planning Areas for West Milton and Laura/Potsdam related to sanitary sewer for Ludlow Falls

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts the above-referenced 2010 Amendment to the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan and recommends its certification by the State of Ohio.

**Subject:** SFY2018-SFY2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #16

Over the last few months MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for an SFY2018-SFY2021 TIP amendment. The attached TIP Tables 4.1, 4.2 and 4.3 reflect the updated information for each specific project. Modifications to Statewide Line Item projects are shown on Table 4.6 and are provided for information only. A TIP terminology explanation chart of key abbreviations used in the highway/bikeway tables precedes Table 4.1.

#### **Transportation Performance Management**

Starting on May 27, 2018, TIP amendments must be developed in compliance with the transportation performance measure requirements of the FAST Act for safety measures. In November 2017 MVRPC's Board of Directors adopted a resolution supporting ODOT's safety performance management targets for the five performance measures outlined in the Fast Act. Ohio's targets infer a 1% annual reduction goal for each of the five safety performance measures. To aid in meeting those targets in the MVRPC Region, MVRPC continues to plan, program, and fund projects that have a positive impact in achieving the targets outlined in the State's HSIP report. Starting on October 1, 2018, TIP amendments must be developed in compliance with the transportation performance measure requirements of the FAST Act regarding transit assets. In June 2017, MVRPC's Board of Directors adopted a resolution adopting transit asset management (State of Good Repair) targets and MVRPC is currently coordinating with the three regional transit agencies on their individual Transit Asset Management Plans (TAMs). MVRPC is also working on a TAM for the 5310 program assets and the 5310 program TAM is expected to be adopted at the October 4, 2018 Board of Directors' meeting. There are currently 33 active projects in the TIP that address assets that are the subjects of TAMs (vehicles and facilities). The total cost of these projects is over \$182 million.

Starting on May 20, 2019, TIP amendments must be developed in compliance with the transportation performance measure requirements of the FAST Act for pavement condition, bridge condition, National Highway System (NHS) travel time reliability, freight travel time reliability and emissions reduction measures. In October 2018, MVRPC's Board of Directors adopted a resolution supporting ODOT's performance management targets for all the performance measures under each rule, applicable to the MVRPC MPO region, as outlined in the FAST Act. Ohio's targets reflect a review of historical data and trends for each performance measure. To aid in meeting those targets in the MVRPC Region, MVRPC



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continues to plan, program, and fund projects that have a positive impact in achieving the targets set by the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT).

#### **Pavement Condition**

Of the currently active projects (98), funded with STP, CMAQ, and TA funds, between SFY 2019 and SFY 2023, 8 projects assist in improving pavement conditions on the NHS. All 8 projects are applicable only to the non-interstate NHS pavements, and are funded with STP funds. The total cost of these 8 projects is nearly \$12.3 million, which includes all phases of the projects and all funding sources. In addition to these projects, there are 17 pavement condition improvement projects with a total cost of \$46.3 million on the interstate system and 18 pavement condition improvement projects with a total cost of nearly \$19.2 million on the non-Interstate NHS system that are funded with ODOT controlled funds.

#### **Bridge Condition**

There are currently no bridge improvement projects on the NHS funded with MVRPC regionally controlled funds. There are 54 bridge improvement projects with a total cost of \$82.7 million on the NHS that are funded with ODOT controlled funds.

#### **NHS Travel Time Reliability**

Of the currently active projects (98), funded with STP, CMAQ, and TA funds, between SFY 2019 and SFY 2023, 3 projects assist in improving travel time reliability on the NHS. All 3 projects are applicable only to the non-interstate NHS. The total cost of these projects funded with STP and CMAQ funds is a little over \$6.7 million, which includes all phases of the projects and all funding sources. In addition to these projects, there might be additional travel time reliability improvement projects on the interstate system or projects with a larger scope on the non-interstate NHS as a part of ODOT funded TIP projects. Such projects tend to require larger investments, and are typically funded by ODOT.

#### Freight Travel Time Reliability

There are currently no freight travel time reliability improvement projects funded with MVRPC regionally controlled funds. Freight travel time reliability improvement projects are only applicable to the interstate system of the NHS, and might exist as a part of ODOT funded TIP projects. Since State DOTs have jurisdiction over the interstate system, and since such projects tend to require larger investments, they are typically funded by ODOT.

#### **CMAQ Project Emissions Reduction**

Of the currently active projects (98), funded with STP, CMAQ, and TA funds, between SFY 2019 and SFY 2023, 27 projects are MVRPC CMAQ-funded projects that would assist in reducing on-road mobile source emissions in the MVRPC MPO region. The cost of these 27 projects is nearly \$40 million, which includes all phases of the projects and all funding sources. An additional 4 projects, with a total cost of nearly \$53.6 million, are funded through ODOT's CMAQ program.



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The table below summarizes the number of projects and their total cost under each performance management rule.

TRAC project solicitation began May 1, 2019 and applications are due to ODOT by May 31, 2019. MVRPC will work in coordination with ODOT to acknowledge and review all TRAC applications within the MPO region for the current solicitation.

Prior to the official TRAC public hearing for our area, MVRPC is encouraged to provide to the TRAC a list of all projects in the MVRPC area ranked in order of the region's priority as determined by the MPO's policy board. TRAC project applications that fall within MVRPC's boundaries will be required to have an acknowledgement letter from MVRPC.

#### **Important Dates**

- TRAC Application solicitation begins on May 1, 2019
- TRAC Applications are due to ODOT by May 31, 2019
- TRAC PES scoring documents are due to MVRPC by May 31, 2019
- MVRPC will forward a prioritized list of projects to the TRAC by June 2019
- Project public hearings are scheduled during August 21, 2019

Project Sponsors are encouraged to attend with their local partners and to speak on behalf of their project. Our region's TRAC hearing was held at ODOT Central in previous years.

The TRAC program is designed to provide funding for major new construction projects, defined as projects with a total cost of more than \$12 million. These projects are typically located on interstate highways or other high volume multi lane highways.

In March, 1991, before the World Wide Web went live to the world, Laura Loges was hired as MVRPC's RIDESHARE Coordinator. As a 1982 graduate of the University of Dayton with a degree in Communications, Public Relations & Promotions, she had worked for the U.S. Census Bureau, the City of Dayton, and E.F. McDonald/Carlson Marketing Group in a variety of roles. Her background proved very useful as she guided the expansion of the RIDESHARE Program. In 1994, in response to the Clean Air Act Amendments, she



developed an "Ozone Action Program" which eventually became MVRPC's Air Quality Awareness Program. It featured a grade school-based outreach program with the "SMOGINATOR" as its mascot, a gas cap testing program, and the issuance of alerts to inform residents when air pollution levels were high. The effort won the *Governor's Award for Outstanding Achievement in Pollution Prevention Education, Awareness and Outreach*, plus a HERMES award from the American Advertising Federation (Dayton Chapter) for companion radio commercials. Over the years, her role expanded to include streamlining the agency's public participation policy, serving as the public information officer (PIO), planning and coordinating the Annual Spring Dinner, overseeing the development of the Annual Report, negotiating sponsorships and donation for various programs, and developing communications pieces for MVRPC as a whole. In 2017, a series of 3 TV commercials highlighting several member jurisdictions

and MVRPC's role in the Region received a bronze national TELLY Award. Laura is looking forward to retiring on May 31, 2019 and plans to volunteer with a local animal shelter and for her 2020 presidential candidate where she will use the World Wide Web as the primary communication method every day.

#### The 2020 Census is Less Than a Year Away and Preparations are Underway at MVRPC

MVRPC, as a U.S. Census Affiliate organization, hosted a Participant Statistical Areas Program (PSAP) workshop on April 18, 2019. The workshop provided an opportunity to review proposed changes to census tracts and to solicit input from local stakeholders on various census geographies for Darke, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, and Preble counties. MVRPC will compile information and submit recommendations to the Census Bureau in May, per their guidelines. The resulting geographies will be used for data tabulation and reporting purposes in the 2020 Census and future American Community Surveys.



To ensure a complete and accurate count across the Miami Valley, MVRPC is assisting our members in forming or participating in a Complete Count Committee (CCC). A CCC is a volunteer committee made of local community leaders whose aim is to increase awareness and motivate residents to participate in the Census by bringing trusted voices to the process. These committees are in the process of forming, or have been formed, in Greene, Miami, and Montgomery Counties. They are intended to be customizable to reflect the area's unique make up and needs. As such, each of the Region's CCCs has a different composition and approach to increase Census awareness and to target hard-to-count populations.
