The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors met on March 4, 2021 at 9:00 a.m. via Zoom Video Conference (https://02web.zoom.us/j/87647642836). All members and news media were notified of the meeting pursuant to the Sunshine Law.

I. INTRODUCTIONS

Chairperson Mucher called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. Ms. Laura Henry did a roll call by jurisdiction.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by Chairperson Mucher.

III. APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY 4, 2021 MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Berry made a motion to approve the minutes from the February 4, 2021 Board meeting.

Mr. Bruns seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

IV. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON ACTION ITEMS

V. RPC (REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Election of Officers - Report of Nominations Committee/Election of Officers

Ms. Berbach gave the nomination committee report stating they recommend Mr. Chris Mucher, Miami Township - Greene County for the position of Chairperson, Mr. Greg Simmons, Miami County, for the position of 1st Vice Chairperson, and Ms. Sara Lommatzsch, City of Riverside - Montgomery County for the position of 2nd Vice Chairperson.

Chairperson Mucher entertained a motion to approve the nominations of officers for 2021.

Mr. Stroud made a motion to adopt the slate of officers. Ms. Wallace seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

VI. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Recommended Adoption of Amendment to MVRPC's SFY 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to the amendment #7 to the SFY 2021-2024 TIP and the numerous project changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He referenced the packet showing the tables broken down by county, as well as the statewide line item project tables. Mr. Arnold stated the TAC recommends the Board of Directors approving the resolution on page 27.

Mr. Bruns made a motion to approve amending the SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Mr. Joseph seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Recommended for MVRPC Regional Controlled STP, CMAQ and TA Funds

Mr. Arnold reviewed the recommended project list for STP, CMAQ, and TA funds. Mr. Arnold referred to the tables on pages 31-35 listing the recommended projects by fund type and projects that MVRPC is unable to fund.

To follow the statewide CMAQ Policy, recommended CMAQ projects must be submitted to the statewide CMAQ Committee and a final decision for those projects should be available by December 2021.

Mr. Arnold stated that staff recommends approving the recommended list of CY2020 STP, CMAQ, and TA projects and referred to a resolution on page 37.

Mr. Donaghy made a motion to approve the MVRPC Regional Controlled STP, CMAQ and TA Funds. Ms. Joanna Garcia seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

VI. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Rideshare Program, Air Quality Awareness Program and Safety Campaign Update

Ms. Henry provided an update on the MVRPC's Rideshare Program, Air Quality Awareness Program, and Safety Campaign. MVRPC receives funding from ODOT for the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program and the goal of CMAQ is to reduce emissions. Also, the Rideshare and Air Quality Awareness Programs are funded by CMAQ. For additional detail, please refer to the packet.

Rideshare outreach has been unavailable for the last year, but there are plans to get back out in the community soon. MVRPC's customer service directs people to the correct resources and will help those who do not have internet access. If your group would like a presentation at your next meeting or material to distribute, please contact Ms. Henry at 937-531-6542 or Lhenry@mvrpc.org or visit our website at www.mvrpc.org.

Mr. Mucher had questions in regards to the return of the unused vanpool funding for 2020 and wanted to know if we were fully funded for the 2021 vanpooling program. Also, Mr. Mucher wanted to know if we still had vans out there anymore. Before the pandemic, Mr. Mucher wanted to know if vans were used sufficiently to justify the funds and did they perform as expected, and would this be something that we would want to reinstitute. Also, he wanted to know if we are planning on reapplying for the funds again.

- Ms. Henry informed Mr. Mucher we received funding for the project in 2016, which
 was a carry over for five years to fund our program. MVRPC had budgeted based on
 the number of vanpools we had and could potentially fund for the duration. However,
 due to the pandemic, MVRPC realized those funds would not be used. Therefore,
 MVRPC returned the funds back to ODOT so those funds could be available for other
 projects.
- There are no vans currently on the road. Prior to the pandemic, Commute with Enterprise had 11 vans on the road. Due to the pandemic, we had one van on the road. This van went to Wright Patterson Airforce Base, but later did not meet the minimum qualifications to be a vanpool. Therefore, it was suspended through Enterprise.
- MVRPC has a minimum requirement for each van based on size, seating capacity and the number of occupants to ensure that the reduction of emissions justifies our subsidy.
- Yes! They did perform as expected. Enterprise ensures the minimum number of days vans are active and the required number of seats are occupied.
- There would always be room to discuss this as vanpooling shows a great reduction. Especially, when there are five people in the van traveling a long distance to their destination. There is a CMAQ analysis of our emissions reduction that relates to vanpooling, which is done each year and it shows a reduction of emissions for our Region.

At this time, we have no plans to reapply for the funds.

Mr. Bruns had a question regarding bikepooling and wanted to know what this was.

• This is a way for the cyclists to be able to commute together, which is similar to carpooling.

B. 2021 Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) Update

Mr. Daniel provided an update of the 2021 Transportation Review Advisory Council. The TRAC defines major new capacity projects as those projects greater than \$12 million, which increases the capacity of a transportation facility or reduces congestion.

TRAC started accepting applications on Monday, March 1, 2021 and are due by Friday, March 26, 2021. For additional information regarding the dates of the application review and evaluation, application scoring, Regional hearings, work session, draft list, public comment period, and the final list, please refer to your packet.

Mr. Daniel provided links to the TRAC and MVRPC websites for those to submit their applications online.

VII. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Martin added that TRAC consists of a Board that makes decisions on projects being funded each year by ODOT.

Mr. Martin recognized Mr. Mark Donaghy for his upcoming retirement, with the Greater Dayton RTA, on April 1, 2021. Mr. Bob Ruzinsky is his replacement. Mr. Martin thanked Mr. Donaghy for the Regional aspect of transit. In addition to this, Mr. Martin recognized Mr. Donaghy as being a great partner with Greene CATS, Miami County Transit, and Warren County Transit and with others. Mr. Donaghy also helped to get bikeshare off the ground in the downtown Dayton area. Mr. Martin thanked him for his friendship and the great counsel he provided to him. Also, Mr. Martin thanked Mr. Donaghy for preparing a great leadership team at RTA and for his service to the Miami Valley Region.

Mr. Donaghy thanked Mr. Martin as he cannot say enough about the partnerships he had here. He recognized how people here can put their differences aside and come together when great things need to be done for the entire Region. Mr. Donaghy informed the group that he has worked in other Regions, but he has never served on a Board that is so efficient and one that gets things done. Regardless of our differences, we are able to find the middle ground to get things done for the community, which is a great lasting impression for him. Mr. Donaghy wishes every one the best and thanked everyone for their well wishes.

A. Executive Director's Update

Mr. Martin reviewed the ED's Update:

CRRSAA Funding to be Available for MVRPC Transportation Solicitation

A portion of the funds are available for sub-allocation to urbanized areas with a population greater than 200,000 and the share for MVRPC is approximately \$5.2 million. MVRPC intends to implement a simple resurfacing program with the CY 2021 Fall application cycle using this funding.

• State Transportation Biennium Budget Request

MVRPC is a big supporter of the bill for distracted driving as a primary offense just like driving under the influence of alcohol.

Mr. Martin reviewed the rest of the ED's Update and upcoming MVRPC Meetings.

Mr. Martin thanked the staff for continuing the work of the Agency.

and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021

Beginning in FY 2013, the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) redesigned the Section 5310 Program, known as Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities. Section 5310 became a regionally-managed program, with an annual regional allocation. MVRPC was named the Designated Recipient of those funds by the Governor, and in collaboration, with GDRTA, administers the program in the Dayton Urbanized Area. Section 5310 primarily funds capital projects (vehicles) to be operated by nonprofit or transit agencies to provide supplemental transportation to seniors and individuals with disabilities. Other uses of these funds include preventive maintenance for those vehicles, Mobility Management, and completion of pedestrian infrastructures that makes transit more accessible to people with disabilities.

On December 27, 2020 the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) was passed in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency. The FTA announced a total of \$14 billion in Federal funding allocations to supplement Section 5307, 5311 and 5310 formula grants. Funding from CRRSAA will support expenses eligible under 5310 program, with a priority on payroll and operational needs.

The Miami Valley Region was allocated \$761,241 for Federal Fiscal Year 2020 from the Section 5310 program and \$132,086 from CRRSAA. Greene CATS applied for \$135,000 of FY 2020, 5310 Specialized Transportation Grant funding for Mobility Management from January 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. The Greater Dayton RTA, in partnership with regional transit partners Greene CATS Public Transit and Miami County Transit, is requesting funding to establish a regional Medical Shuttle Service to transport those in need to medical appointments and prescription pickups in Miami, Montgomery and Greene Counties. This will include transporting passengers on medical trips for COVID-19 vaccination sites.

A resolution adopting the attached Program of Projects and authorizing submission of a grant application to the Federal Transit Administration is attached for your review. The MVRPC staff recommends your approval.

Dear Ms. Keels,

The Greater Dayton RTA, in partnership with our regional transit partners, Greene Cats and Miami County Transit, are submitting 5310 projects for your consideration. GDRTA will agree to be the grantee for these projects, extending our past arrangement for an additional year to allow time for MVRPC to take on the grant process later this year.

Project One – Mobility Management services provided by Greene Cats. It is our understanding that Greene Cats was previously approved for 6 months of continued MM. We would ask this be increased to up to 18 months at a total of \$135,000 in federal funds with Greene Cats providing the 20% local match. They have done a great job with this over the past 5 years and are in good standing with us.

Project Two – The establishment of a regional Medical Shuttle service to assist in getting those in need to medical appointments and related things such as prescription pickups. This would a joint effort between RTA, Miami County Transit (MCT), and Greene Cats (GC). The program would be funded with 100% federal funds using a combination of available formula 5310 funds from FFY 2020, and recently allocated CRRSSA funds. We would purchase a small bus each for MCT and GC, as well as 5 small vans for RTA. Operating support would funds the services for the first 18 months. The passenger cost would be minimal to encourage use. We would certainly provide needed rides for vaccines using this program. This proposed program would use \$400,000 in available FFY2020 formula funds for the vehicles. It would use \$125,117 in FFY2020 formula funds for operating support, along with \$118,878 in FFY 2021 CRRSSA funds, for a total of \$243,995 for services. We would expect to apply in the future for funding to continue the program longer term, using any available formula funding once the vehicle needs of others are satisfied.

Project Three – Transit Access improvements to make it easier to access established bus stops. RTA will run the program and provide the \$6,250 in matching funds for the federal formula funds from FFY 2020 of \$25,000.

Project Four – Program Administration funds at the allowed 10% of allocation level to allow MVRPC to administer and grow the programs. This would be funded from FFY2021 formula funds in the amount of \$77,004 and FFY 2021 CRRSSA funds in the amount of \$13,208 for a total of \$90,212. These funds are at 100% federal. MVRPC is in good standing with RTA and has been a strong leader in the 5310 efforts over the past 5 years.

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Carlisle, Franklin, Springboro and Franklin Township in Warren County; and

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) was named by the Governor of Ohio as the Designated Recipient for the Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310) for the Dayton Urbanized Area; and

WHEREAS, the federal surface transportation bill, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act) provides a regional allocation for the Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310) to be administered by the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Transit Administration (FTA); and

WHEREAS, FTA regulations require that each urbanized area create a locally developed Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan prior to the award of these funds and that original plan was adopted in 2008 with plan updates adopted in 2012 and 2019 by the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplementation Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) allocated \$900 billion in supplemental appropriations in 2021 for COVID-19 relief, providing \$50 million to the Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Section 5310 formula grant; and

WHEREAS, CRRSAA funding is provided at one hundred percent (100%) federal share, with no local match required and is intended to prioritize payroll and operational needs to support the transit industry during the COVID-19 public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC staff, in consultation with the Greater Dayton Regional Transit Authority, Greene CATS Public Transit and Miami County Transit, has developed a program of projects to address the transportation needs of those populations that adheres to the guidelines of the Section 5310 program, meets the goals of Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan and meets the needs of those who are impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission adopts the Program of Projects for the FY2020 allocations of the Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program and authorizes the submission of an application to the Federal Transit Administration for the funding of those projects.

Subject: Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) Funding

This information is being provided in anticipation of MVRPC receiving \$5.2 million in CRRSAA funding. This funding would be additional STP funds set aside for simple resurfacing projects available during the Fall 2021 project solicitation cycle. This information item serves as a notification to jurisdictions to allow ample time to develop projects for the project solicitation in September.

• Approximately \$5.2 million is available for simple resurfacing projects. These are the types of projects that can be developed and awarded much more quickly than standard reconstruction projects. Therefore, projects including ADA ramp work will NOT be eligible for funding under this program and any necessary ADA ramp work must be completed prior to submitting the application to MVRPC. Local jurisdictions are required to indicate on the application that a field visit took place (date of visit), measurements were taken, and ADA compliance of ramps within the project verified. Submitting documentation to MVRPC or ODOT is not required but should be kept in case compliance is ever questioned. Projects that include curb and gutter work will be considered for funding, but Federal funds will only be used to fund the resurfacing portion of the project. Curb and gutter work can be part of the project but will be completed using local funds.

Additional requirements follow:

- Eligible roadways must have a functional classification of either Urban Collector or above or Rural Major Collector or above.
- Maximum of \$400,000 Federal available per project.
- Federal participation will be 100%. If project cost is more than \$400,000, local funding at 100% above the Federal cap will be required.
- Projects must be authorized by December 31, 2023.

Undesign the Redline Exhibit

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) is an active sponsor for the Undesign the Redline Exhibit. The exhibit will be premiered at the Dayton Metro Library from August 6, 2021 to September 25, 2021. Following Dayton Metro Library, the exhibit will be featured at the University of Dayton (October 2021); Sinclair College (November 2021); and Wright State University (February 2022).

"Undesign the Redline" is an educational exhibit that traces the roots of government policies to social issues we face. The exhibit encourages discussions about race, wealth, opportunity and power, with the goal of transforming the future. The exhibit will include substantial local history and stories that show the impact of Redlining on Miami Valley families.

MVRPC's staff are participating on the exhibit steering committee; the communications subcommittee; as well as the story collection subcommittee. MVRPC staff completed story collection interviews in March.

Romero Human Rights Award Series

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) is co-sponsoring the Romero Human Rights Award Series. The 2021 Romero Award ceremony and symposium consists of online events celebrating the perseverance and achievements of environmental and climate justice advocates. The University of Dayton will launch the four-part series on Wednesday, March 24, 2021. The award will be issued on Tuesday, April 20, 2021.

On April 7, MVRPC is moderating a 75-minute roundtable discussion entitled "A Movement Takes Flight". The roundtable will feature environmental justice trailblazers who organized or attended the First National People of Color Environmental Leadership Summit in October 1991. The session will commemorate the 30th anniversary of the summit.

MVRPC created this website to provide all of the latest updates on construction projects that could impact commutes throughout the Region. It also provides user-friendly access to route planning tools, commute solutions and other ideas to reduce congestion and prevent air pollution for the areas under construction.

S.R. 235 Bridge Repair Projects: Phase 1 has begun on three separate projects to upgrade the State Route 235 Corridor in Montgomery and Greene Counties.

Montgomery County - The State Route 235 (Chambersburg Rd.)/State Route 4 Interchange will undergo rehabilitation. The project will raise the S.R. 235 (Chambersburg Rd.) Bridge over S.R. 4, replace the driving surface and install new galvanized beams. During construction, the bridge will be closed for up to 150 days through Mid-August. There will also be several ramp closures in coordination with the construction phases. During bridge construction, traffic will be detoured via S.R. 201, I-70, and S.R. 444.

Greene County - S.R. 235 will be reduced to one lane between S.R. 4 and Medway Road, where crews will be rehabilitating the bridges over Mud Run and Mad River in Greene County. The single-lane restriction is in effect through August 2021.
