The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors met on May 7, 2026 at 9:00 a.m. at Dayton Realtors, 1515 S. Main Street, Dayton, OH 45409. All members and news media were notified of the meeting pursuant to the Sunshine Law.

I. INTRODUCTIONS

Chairperson Oda called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Self-introductions were made and a quorum was confirmed for the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's Board of Directors meeting. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

II. APPROVAL OF MARCH 5, 2026 MEETING MINUTES

Ms. Destefani moved to approve the minutes from the March 5, 2026 Board meeting. Ms. Vonderhaar seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON ACTION ITEMS

No public comments were made.

IV. RPC (REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Resolution 26-14: Approving the Submission of the SFY2027 Final Budget and Work Program to Grantor Agencies

Mr. Lucas presented the Final SFY 2027 Budget and Work Program. He discussed Schedules A-G giving a brief summary of each table. Mr. Lucas highlighted key changes and updates and noted the Agency's overall budget for FY27:

- Schedule A – The overall agency budget shows lower revenues due to completion of some Federal grants
- Schedule E – Collection of our member dues is stable.
- Schedule F – Revenue Table – This table shows specific Federal grants received from several Agencies, as well as State and Local funding for specific projects.
- Schedule G – Capital Budget – Computer costs remain stable, due to the new networking and technical items from the 2025 move not yet needing for replacement.
- Narrative – Schedules, work projects and work items that the agency is doing are all in there

Mr. Lucas stated the Overhead Cost Allocation Program is submitted ODOT helped to set up cost recovery. Fringe benefit rates have increased this year, 62-63% is pretty high, compared to last 4 previous budgets, as the Agency tries to plan for healthcare cost increases. There also are some unknowns out there.

Mr. Martin further explained that MVRPC staff are currently evaluating new healthcare insurance options, as the agency will no longer be covered under Montgomery County's healthcare plan at the end of CY2026. He stated that staff are working with McGohan Brabender, an employee benefits management consultant, to identify the best available option and are also applying to a consortium for consideration. He then opened the floor for questions.

Ms. Byrge moved to approve the submission of the SFY 2027 Final Budget and Work Program to Grantor Agencies. Mr. Hankins seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Martin announced the retirement of Mr. Mike Lucas. Mr. Lucas has served MVRPC for more than 30 years and will retire effective July 1, 2026. He has served as the Director of Agency Operations for the past five years. Mr. Martin further announced that Ms. Tiffany Thomas has been promoted to Deputy Director of Agency Operations and will succeed Mr. Lucas as Director of Agency Operations upon his retirement.

B. Resolution 26-13: Approving the Recommendation to the Dayton Foundation to Fund the 2026 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant

Mr. Biondo presented the 2026 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant proposal submitted by Preble County requesting funding to conduct a countywide needs assessment. He explained that the recommendation is to award a \$20,000 grant to support the assessment, which will identify the needs of older adults throughout Preble County.

Mr. Biondo stated that Age-Friendly Preble County is a collaborative effort between the Preble County Council on Aging, Preble County government, and participating cities. He further explained that the project will utilize a mixed-methods approach, including online and paper surveys, focus groups, and one-on-one interviews to ensure broad and representative community input from across the County.

Mr. Biondo then stated that staff and the Institute for Livable & Equitable Communities Steering Committee recommend Board approval to forward the grant proposal to the Dayton Foundation for funding consideration.

Ms. Byrge moved to approve the recommendation to the Dayton Foundation to fund the 2026 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant. Mr. Joseph seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Lastly, Mr. Biondo stated that the second grant cycle application deadline is October 1, 2026 and invited MVRPC members to learn more about becoming an Age-Friendly Community.

V. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Resolution 26-10: Recommended Adoption of the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan

Ms. Ramirez presented information regarding the adoption of the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Update and provided a summary of the public participation efforts conducted as part of the planning process. She explained that MVRPC held a public participation meeting on April 8, 2026, following a ten-month process of coordination with local jurisdictions, stakeholders, and the public to identify multimodal congestion management strategies. Outreach efforts included newspaper advertisements, social media promotion, press releases, direct mailings, transit outreach, and online engagement opportunities. She further noted that the 2050 LRTP meets federal planning requirements under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), is fiscally constrained, and demonstrates conformity with applicable air quality standards. Lastly, Ms. Ramirez thanked MVRPC staff, Hannah Wilson, Aaron Lee, and Ian Cole for their work on the 2050 LRTP updates and Bryce Gullet and Laura Dent for the website updates. She then stated that staff and the Technical Advisory Committee recommend Board approval of the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan.

Mr. Stroud moved to approve the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan. Mr. Litteral seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Resolution 26-06: Recommended Adoption of Revision #9 to MVRPC's SFY2026-2029 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to the ninth revision to the SFY 2026-2029 TIP and the numerous project changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He reviewed key project details for all local jurisdiction projects and tables by county. He paused for any questions about the statewide line-item project tables or any projects. Afterwards, Mr. Arnold stated that staff and the

Technical Advisory Committee recommend approving revision #9 to MVRPC's SFY2026-2029 TIP.

Mr. Bruns moved to approve the amendment to MVRPC's SFY 2026-2029 TIP. Mr. Byington seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

VI. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. TRAC Solicitation Update for Considering Major New Capacity Projects

Mr. Daniel provided an update on the Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) Project Solicitation. He stated that MVRPC was notified on May 6, 2026 by ODOT that the TRAC project solicitation has been postponed until further notice. MVRPC will provide updated solicitation information to members as it becomes available.

B. Going Places Implementation Tools

Mr. Kim provided an update regarding MVRPC's Going Places Implementation Tools. He explained how MVRPC can assist members with local community planning support, data and mapping, regional geographic information system (GIS) services, and regional data profiles. Mr. Martin then stated that MVRPC staff are a multi-disciplinary team with expertise on transportation planning, land use planning, environmental planning, strategic planning, GIS and other planning support system, data analysis and mapping, best practices research, group facilitation, and grant funding research. Lastly, Mr. Kim shared a few examples of services offered to MVRPC members such as partnering on projects, hosting public and/or training workshops, attending community events, and joining steering committees. He then invited members to find more information on MVRPC's website.

VII. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

A. Executive Director's Update

Mr. Martin thanked members and sponsors for attending MVRPC's Annual Spring Dinner held on April 30, 2026. He congratulated Mr. Matt Joseph on receiving the Arthur D. Haddad Regional Steward Award and Mr. Mike Parks on receiving the Regional Partner Award.

SUBJECT: May 2026 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant-Award Recommendation

Age-Friendly Communities have responded to the encouragement from MVRPC and The Dayton Foundation (TDF) to apply for funding to conduct Needs Assessments and to implement their Age-Friendly action plans.

The proposals received address multiple Age-Friendly Domains: Health Services, Communication & Information, Respect & Social Inclusion, Civic Participation & Employment and Social Participation.

Staff's recommendation is to award five grants with this cycle. Two are from Piqua and Clayton as new Age-Friendly Communities to conduct a Needs Assessments for their communities. The others are Phase 2 grants to implement Age-Friendly action plans.

Please be aware that some recommendations are for less than requested. The recommended award amounts total about 60% of the Age-Friendly Grant budget for the year.

Recommendations for approval in this cycle are as follows:

City of Piqua

Piqua has just enrolled in the AARP Age-Friendly program. As such, they are ready to initiate the Needs Assessment step in the process. The City has met all of the pre-requisites to be eligible for the assessment. The recommendation is to award the full amount requested as this is the same amount awarded to Trotwood which has a similar population.

Total Amount Requested: \$15,000
Total Project Budget: \$15,000
Amount Recommended: \$15,000

City of Clayton

Like Piqua, Clayton has just enrolled in the AARP Age-Friendly program. As such, they are ready to initiate the Needs Assessment step in the process. The City has met all of the pre-requisites to be eligible for grant money for the assessment. The recommendation is to award less than the amount requested as Clayton has a much smaller size population. Clayton population is similar to Jefferson Township. Jefferson was awarded \$10,000 last fall.

Total Amount Requested: \$18,000
Total Project Budget: \$18,000
Amount Recommended: \$10,000

City of Brookville

Age-Friendly Domains: *Health Services; Respect and Social Inclusion; Social Participation*

Brookville is seeking grant support to enhance its age-friendly park features with outdoor exercise equipment engineered for older adults. This unique equipment allows for both organized programs used with both an exercise instructor or individual, unsupervised use. While it is designed for older adults, it is also available for any age person to use.

The invitation to apply for grants specified that the maximum amount available is \$10,000 but that communities are welcome to request more. The amount of money available directly determines the number of exercise pieces that Brookville may acquire.

Total Amount Requested: \$30,000

Total Project Budget: \$30,000

Amount Recommended: \$10,000

Village of Yellow Springs/Yellow Springs Senior Citizens, Inc.

Age-Friendly Domains: *Communication & Information*

Yellow Springs asks for funding to fulfill one of its Action Plan steps, directly related to input from their needs assessment. The project is to print and distribute a magazine-style informative resource guide.

The guide will hold a directory of services-- public and private-- available to older adults in Yellow Springs. The guide will be distributed to Yellow Springs Senior Center members, and to their many partners. Once complete, Yellow Springs intends to share the product and the process with all members of the Miami Valley Age-Friendly Network.

Total Amount Requested: \$5,300

Total Project Budget: \$7,300

Amount Recommended: \$5,300

City of Huber Heights

Age-Friendly Domains: *Social Participation; Health Services; Respect & Inclusion; Outdoor Spaces & Buildings.*

The City of Huber Heights is seeking funding for its continuing Senior Center Scholarship Program. This program successfully collaborates with the YMCA and the non-profit Huber Heights Senior Center to encourage older adults to participate in exercise programs designed for them. The scholarship is available to senior residents who are not eligible for fitness benefits through Medicare Advantage plans. The scholarship is made available to military retirees and individuals on fixed incomes who are not eligible for "Silver Sneakers" and similar programs. This collaboration has been serving residents for the past two years. This grant allows for a continuation.

Total Amount Requested: \$5,000

Total Project Budget: \$12,188

RESOLUTION 26-16
REVISING THE SFY2026-SFY2029 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning process for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, all Federally funded transit and highway improvements within Greene, Miami and Montgomery County must be included in the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) prior to the expenditure of Federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the SFY2026-SFY2029 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC, ODOT, Miami County Transit and GDRTA have made numerous changes to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2026-SFY2029 TIP revision; and

WHEREAS, the proposed revision is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

WHEREAS, this TIP revision is consistent with the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2026-SFY2029 TIP; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP revisions such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this revision will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the MPO members of the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopt **Revision #10** to the SFY2026-SFY2029 Transportation Improvement Program as shown on the attached TIP Tables.



Air Quality Alert

- The Regional Air Pollution Control Agency (RAPCA) monitors the air in the Miami Valley.
- If and when air pollution levels are forecasted to be high, an "**Air Quality Alert**" will be issued.
- These notices will be issued *the day before* air pollution levels are forecasted to be elevated.
- Poor air quality affects everyone; however, some individuals are susceptible to air pollutants, including children and adults who are active outdoors, older adults, and those with chronic respiratory diseases such as asthma. On AQA days, older adults, young children and those with breathing problems should modify their behavior and limit outdoor time.



AQS is the central database for all data collected by EPA, State, local and tribal air pollution control agencies from over a thousand monitors. AQS data is used to :

- Assess air quality
- **Used for attainment/non-attainment designations**
- Evaluate SIPS for Non-attainment areas
- Perform modeling for permit review analysis
- Prepare reports for Congress

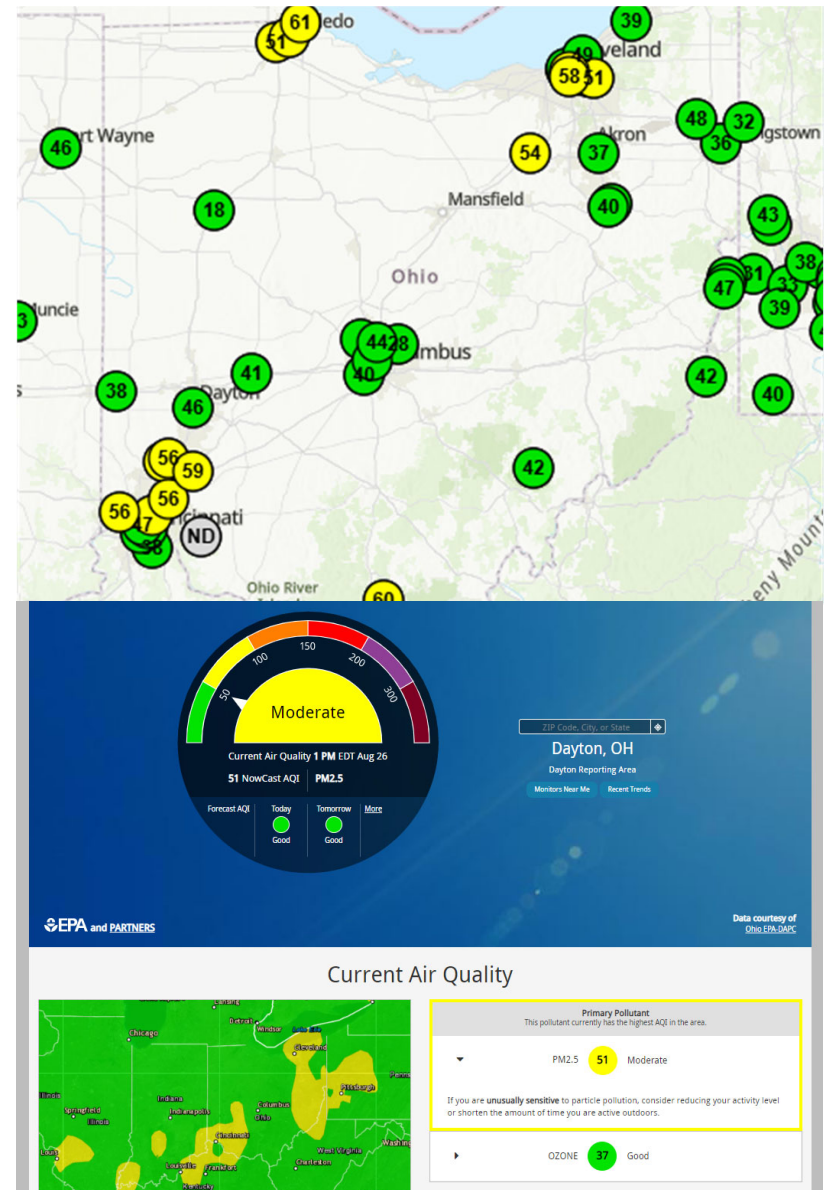

Artificial Light IS a pollutant

All of us are familiar with air pollution, water pollution, and land pollution.

Components of light pollution include:

Glare — excessive brightness causing visual discomfort

Sky glow — brightening of the night sky over inhabited areas

Light trespass — light falling where it is not intended or needed

Clutter — bright, confusing, and excessive groupings of light sources



Glare

Light pollution is the human-made alteration of outdoor light levels from those occurring naturally

Light pollution disrupts **wildlife**

Adversely impacts **human health**

Wastes **money and energy**

Contributes to **climate change**

Blocks **our view of the universe**



Light pollution harms wildlife and ecosystems

Earth's predictable rhythm of day and night is encoded in the DNA of all plants and animals (**including humans**) which **WE** have radically disrupted by lighting up the night

This cycle of light and dark governs life-sustaining behaviors such as reproduction, sleep, nourishment, and protection from predators

- Artificial light at night has negative and deadly effects on amphibians, birds, mammals, insects, and plants



Exposure to artificial light at night harms your health

Proliferation of artificial light at night means most of us no longer experience truly dark nights

Exposure to artificial light at night negatively affects human health, including increased risk for:

Sleep disorders: *American Medical Association*, "... white LED lamps have five times greater impact on circadian sleep rhythms than conventional street lamps. ... brighter residential nighttime lighting is associated with reduced sleep times, dissatisfaction with sleep quality, excessive sleepiness, impaired daytime functioning and obesity."

Diabetes

Heart disease

Cancer

Alzheimers: a 2023 paper by eight physicians and researchers, "... research underlining the complexity of the correlation between light pollution and Alzheimer's disease"



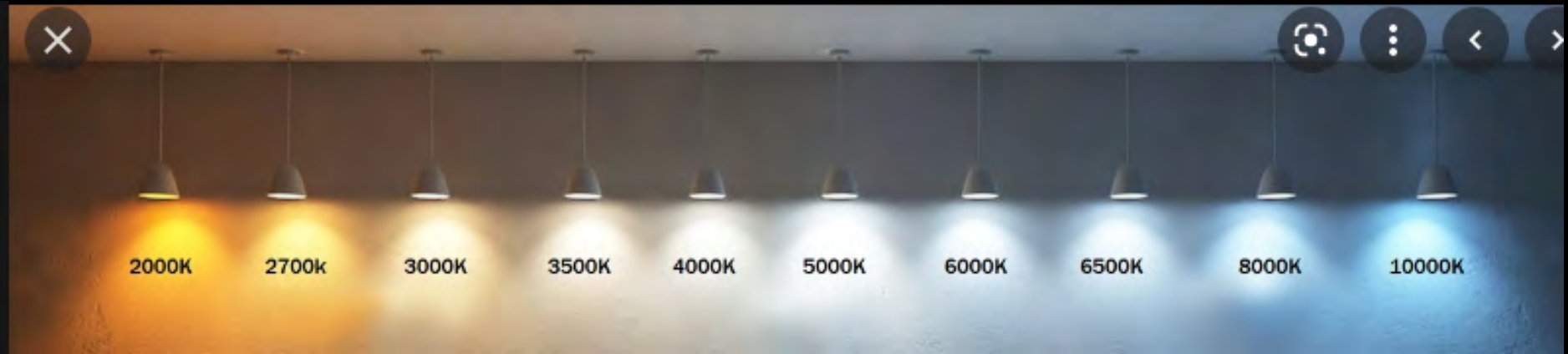

Circadian rhythm and melatonin

Most life adheres to a circadian rhythm — a sleep-wake pattern governed by the natural day/night cycle – artificial light at night disrupts this cycle

- For humans this cycle is largely influenced by photo-receptors in the eye that are more sensitive to blue wavelengths of light
- It's critical to experience outdoor lighting during the day and minimize the amount of this light entering their eyes at night to maintain a good circadian cycle
- **Nighttime exposure to artificial light also suppresses melatonin production**
- **Melatonin has antioxidant properties, induces sleep, boosts the immune system, lowers cholesterol, helps thyroid, pancreas, ovaries, testes, adrenal gland function**



Light pollution wastes energy (\$) & contributes to climate change

Excessive lighting levels & light shining when & where not needed is environmentally wasteful

- US outdoor lighting uses ~120 terawatt-hours of energy/yr (mostly streets/parking lots)
 - Conservatively, more than 30% of all outdoor lighting in the US alone is wasted
 - \$Billion (2019) and 21 million tons of CO₂ per year! (carbon offset – plant 875 million trees/yr)
- Environmental responsibility requires energy efficiency and conservation



Outdoor lighting at night doesn't do what you think it does to reduce crime and increase safety

No clear scientific evidence that increased outdoor lighting deters crimes

Yes, it may make us feel safer, but it has not been shown to make us safer

Provides a perception of safety (security) but not reality



The truth is bad outdoor lighting can decrease safety by making victims and property easier to see

A [Chicago Alley Lighting Project](#) showed a correlation between brightly lit alleyways and increased crime

Most property crime occurs in the light of the day

Vandalism and graffiti actually thrive on night lighting

A dark sky does not necessarily mean a dark ground

Smart lighting that directs light where it is needed creates a balance between safety and starlight

The goal is good visibility not increased brightness



Five Lighting Principles for Responsible Outdoor Lighting



Responsible outdoor lighting is

1 Useful

Use light only if it is needed

All light should have a clear purpose. Consider how the use of light will impact the area, including wildlife and their habitats.



2 Targeted

Direct light so it falls only where it is needed

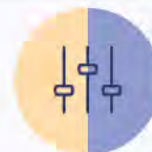
Use shielding and careful aiming to target the direction of the light beam so that it points downward and does not spill beyond where it is needed.



3 Low Level

Light should be no brighter than necessary

Use the lowest light level required. Be mindful of surface conditions, as some surfaces may reflect more light into the night sky than intended.



4 Controlled

Use light only when it is needed

Use controls such as timers or motion detectors to ensure that light is available when it is needed, dimmed when possible, and turned off when not needed.



5 Warm-colored

Use warmer color lights where possible

Limit the amount of shorter wavelength (blue-violet) light to the least amount needed.



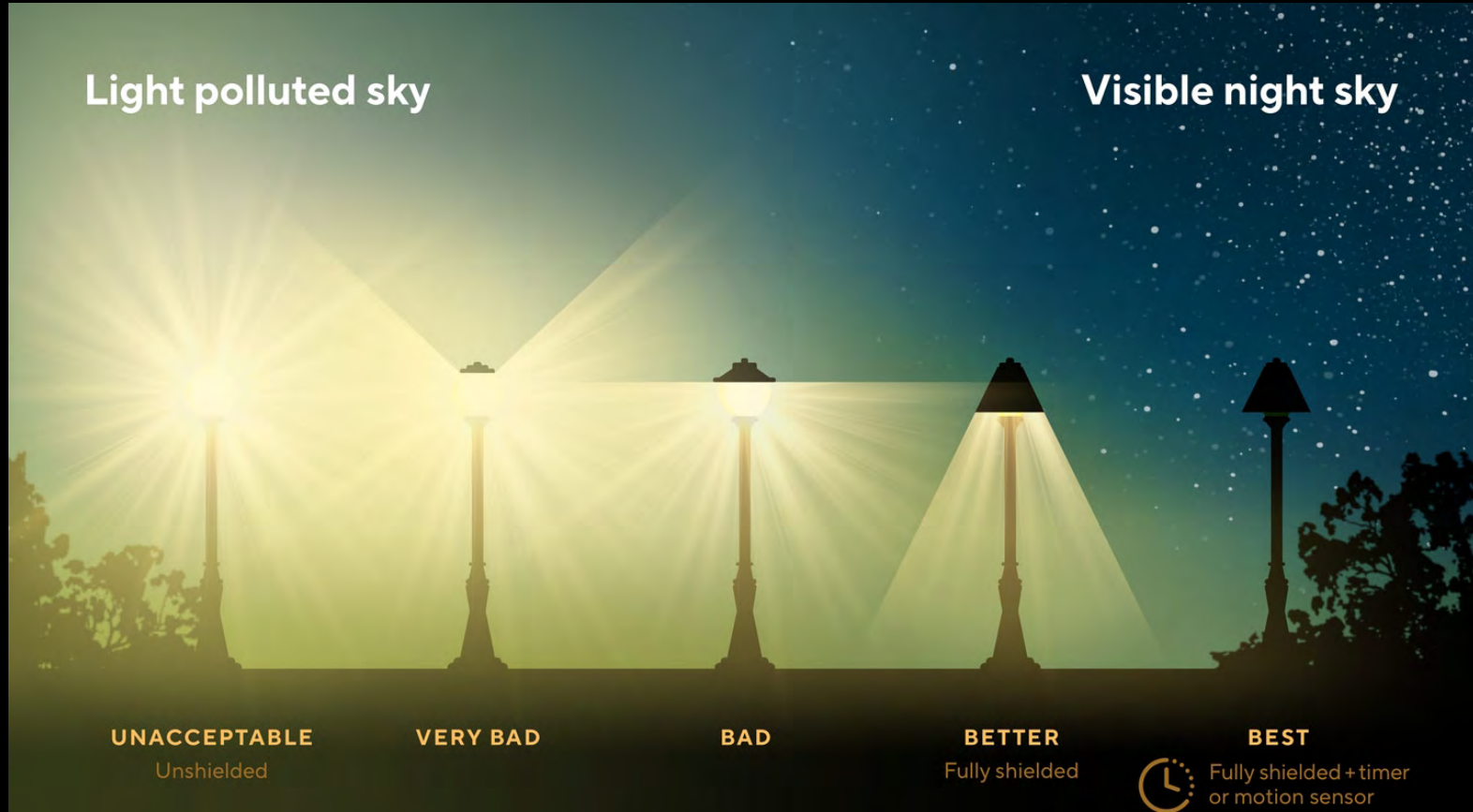
What can be done about light pollution?

Following [responsible lighting practices](#), passing dark sky friendly legislation, and advancing scientific research in this field are just some of the ways light pollution can be solved

Dark Sky Approved Luminaires offer objective, third-party certification for light fixtures

- Virtually **eliminate direct uplight**
- Incorporate **dimming controls**
- **Warmer color temperatures**
- **Reduce reflected light**

Providing beautiful, functional lighting while substantially reducing light pollution

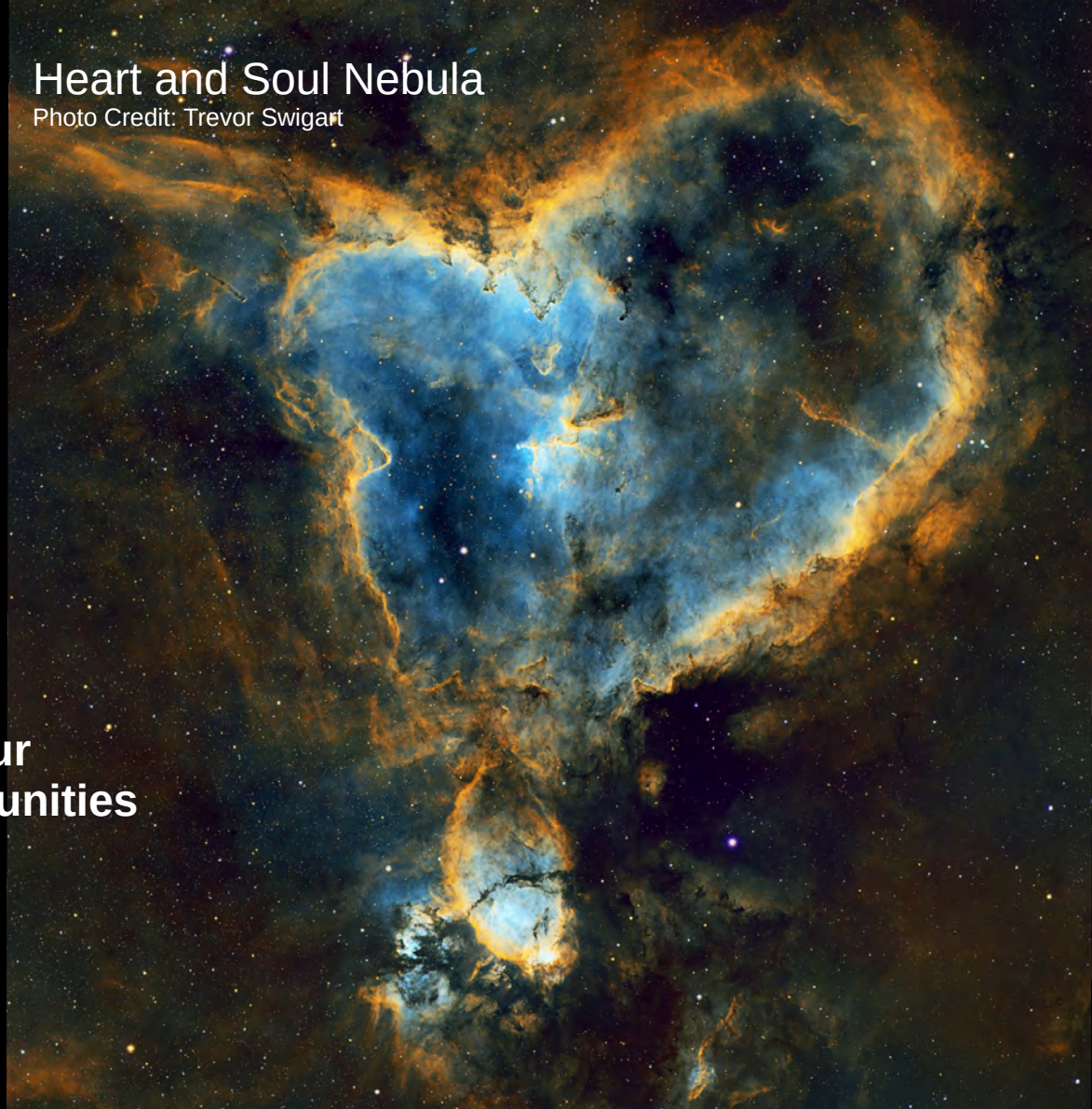

MVRPC Hosts Local Workshops to Advance Active Living



This spring, as part of the PLAN4Health – Miami Valley Initiative, MVRPC has worked with local partners to host three workshops to advance active living within their local communities.

In April, building on existing assets and ideas outlined in City of Xenia's comprehensive plan, MVRPC partnered with city staff to host a workshop focused on identifying opportunities to expand active living options in western areas of the city.

In May, MVRPC worked with City of Kettering to conduct an active living workshop focused on enhancing and expanding opportunities in the vicinity of the Stroop and Marshall Road area. Also in May, MVRPC teamed up with City of Carlisle to explore ways to incorporate more active living features throughout the community's core.



At each workshop, MVRPC staff presented on the topic of active living and led participants through an interactive environmental scan aimed at evaluating areas for active living deficiencies and identification of policy, program, or project level solutions to improve built environment conditions.

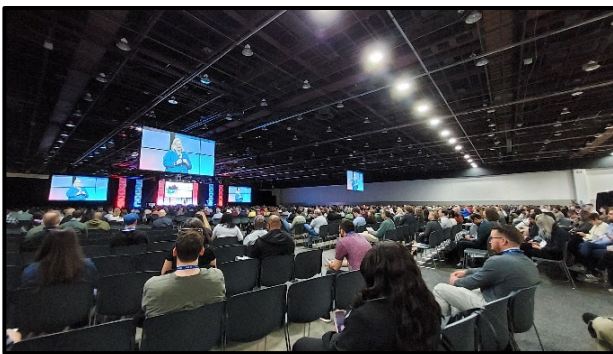

- Advance planning efforts aimed at creating conditions for healthy people and communities



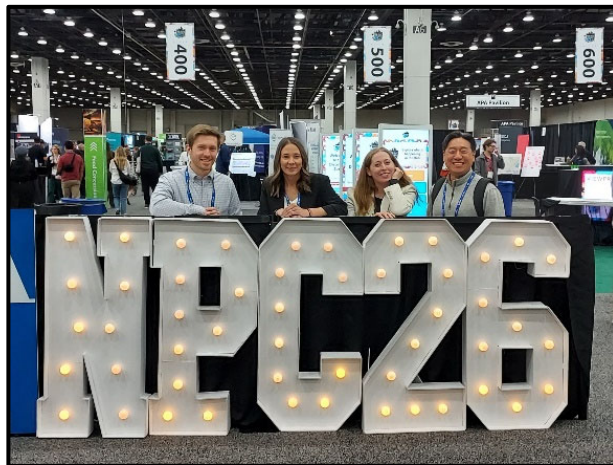

They ranged from improving public engagement strategies to artificial intelligence considerations in the planning profession to zoning law and many other topics. Some sessions were traditional lecture style sessions but others included interactive, hands-on learning opportunities.



The APA National Planning Conference is a great opportunity to learn, connect, and share MVRPC's work with peers in the planning or similar professions. Staff will take the knowledge gained from this conference and apply it to our work in the Miami Valley. This exemplifies the agency's commitment to professional development for staff, while also sharing the good

work happening in the Miami Valley Region.

MVRPC Hosts GIS Training for our Members

MVRPC hosted the first GIS training session of the year on Thursday, May 7, 2026 at Wright State University's GIS Lab. Intended for beginners who are new to ArcGIS Pro, this “ArcGIS Pro-Basics” training session covered hands-on learning modules on how to add, display, configure, and map various data as well as developing and sharing custom maps in ArcGIS Pro.

MVRPC staff served as instructors to nearly 15 participants during the training, providing detailed written tutorials and other materials that attendees could take back to continue to practice



after the training was complete.

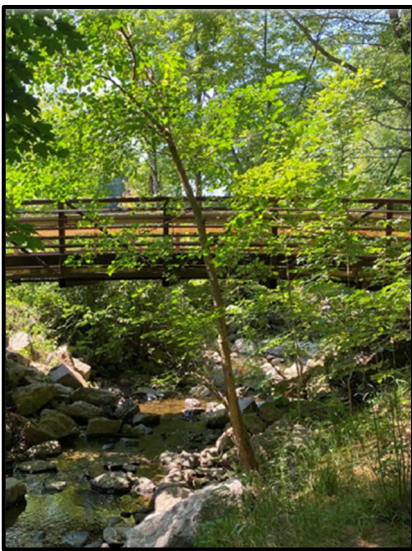

BUILD America 250 Act Advances

On May 21, the U.S. House Transportation & Infrastructure Committee approved the bipartisan BUILD America 250 Act, a proposed five-year surface transportation authorization bill. The legislation would largely maintain current highway and transit funding programs while increasing support for bridge programs.

Conservation Funds are Available through the Clean Ohio Green Space Program



The Clean Ohio Green Space Conservation Program provides annual grants to help communities, park districts and non-profits buy land or create permanent protections for forests, wetlands, and rivers.

Grants are evaluated and recommended by Natural Resource Assistance Councils (NRAC) for each Ohio Public Works Commission district. The District 4 NRAC includes all of Montgomery County. The District 11 NRAC covers all other member counties of MVRPC: Darke, Greene, Miami, Preble and Shelby. For the next round of projects, District 11 has over \$2.2 million available; District 4 has over \$4.9 million available. Local governments, park districts and non-profit conservation organizations are eligible applicants for these funds. Applications are due in October.

The Clean Ohio Green Space Conservation Program provides grants for up to 75 percent of the estimated costs for projects that:

Preserve Open Spaces: Open space acquisition and/or related improvements to those open spaces, including the acquisition of easements. This includes acquisition of land or rights in land for parks, forests, wetlands, and natural areas. Related improvement projects include projects for the construction or enhancement of facilities that are necessary to make the open space area accessible and useable by the general public.

Protect Riparian Corridors: Protection and enhancement of river/stream corridors or watersheds, including the protection of streams, rivers, lakes, and other bodies of water. Projects may include reforestation of land or planting of vegetation for filtration, and fee simple acquisition or acquisition of easements for providing access, or for protection and enhancement.
