The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors met on October 2, 2025 at 9:00 a.m. at Dayton Realtors, 1515 S. Main Street, Dayton, OH 45409. All members and news media were notified of the meeting pursuant to the Sunshine Law.

**I. INTRODUCTIONS**

Chairperson Lommatzsch called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m. Self-introductions were made and a quorum was confirmed for the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's Board of Directors meeting. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mr. Martin announced the retirement of Mr. Matt Parrill, ODOT District 7 Capital Programs Administrator, and expressed appreciation for his 15 years of service on the MVRPC Board of Directors and Technical Advisory Committee. Mr. Parrill thanked MVRPC and the Board for their support and introduced his successor, Mr. Justin Yoh.

**II. APPROVAL OF SEPTEMBER 4, 2025 MEETING MINUTES**

Mr. Joseph made a motion to approve the minutes from the September 4, 2025 Board meeting. Mr. Housh seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

**III. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON ACTION ITEMS**

No public comments were made.

**IV. RPC (REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION) ACTION ITEMS**

**A. Resolution 25-26: 2026 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Revisions**

Ms. Baxter presented a request to support the application to the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) to update the Region's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). She stated that the CEDS was last updated in 2022 and is required to remain compliant with EDA regulations and serves as a prerequisite for many federal funding opportunities. The CY 2026 CEDS revision will include submitting the application, obtaining EDA approval, conducting data analysis, community engagement through a SOAR analysis, and developing an action plan with measurable goals. Broad stakeholder input will be gathered to ensure the plan reflects regional economic priorities.

Next, the floor was opened for questions. Afterwards, Ms. Baxter noted staff, the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and the Regional Transportation Planning Organization Steering Committee (RTPOSC) recommend approval of Resolution 25-26 Requesting Funds from the U.S. EDA to Revise the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the Miami Valley Region to the Board of Directors.

Mr. Stroud made a motion to approve Resolution 25-26. Mr. Gould seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

**VI. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS**

**A. Resolution 25-28: Recommended Adoption of Revision #4 to MVRPC's SFY2026-2029 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)**

Mr. Daniel referred to the fourth revision to the SFY 2026-2029 TIP and the numerous project changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He reviewed key project details for all local jurisdiction projects and tables by county. He paused for any questions about the statewide line-item project tables or any projects. Afterwards, Mr. Daniel stated that staff and the Technical Advisory Committee recommend approving revision #4 to MVRPC's SFY2026-2029 TIP.

Mr. Bruns made a motion to approve the amendment to MVRPC's SFY 2026-2029 TIP. Mr. Housh seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

**VI. INFORMATION ITEMS**

**A. Member Spotlight: Miami Conservancy District**

Ms. Marylynn Lodor, General Manager of the Miami Conservancy District, provided an overview of the District’s regional flood protection system, which safeguards more than one million residents across five counties. She discussed the need for structural repairs to several high-hazard dams and the District’s efforts to modernize its funding model to reflect regional benefits rather than property value alone. Ms. Lodor also highlighted ongoing groundwater protection initiatives and emphasized the importance of regional collaboration to maintain and strengthen the century-old flood protection system. Lastly, she opened the floor for questions. Mr. Kirkpatrick thanked Ms. Lodor and the Miami Conservancy District on behalf of the City of Fairborn, noting the city recently celebrated its 75th anniversary and has been protected by MCD’s flood control system throughout its history.

**B. Sharing MVRPC’s Staff Training and Development Program with the Region**

Mr. Martin presented an overview of MVRPC’s staff training and development initiatives, noting that the program began following the COVID-19 pandemic and several staff retirements. He explained that the agency had established a dedicated training and development budget line item, making this an opportune time to invest in staff growth. Mr. Martin then introduced Ms. Tiffany Thomas, Human Resources Manager, who discussed MVRPC’s partnership with the University of Dayton Center for Leadership (UDCL) to provide professional development opportunities. Ms. Thomas reported that since 2024, 18 staff members have completed UDCL training programs. She then introduced Ms. Kim Schenck, Assistant Director of Business Development at UDCL, who provided an overview of the Center’s training programs. The floor was then opened for questions.

**WHEREAS**, this TIP revision is consistent with the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2026-SFY2029 TIP; and

**WHEREAS**, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP revisions such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

**WHEREAS**, this revision will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

## MEMORANDUM

**SUBJECT:** October 2025 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant-Award Recommendation

Age-Friendly Communities have responded to the encouragement from MVRPC and The Dayton Foundation (TDF) to apply for funding to develop or implement their Age-Friendly action plans. In 2025, the cohort communities had the option of any of three grant proposal deadlines that align with the ISC meetings for review before board adoption. This memorandum addresses the proposals for the third deadline of October 1.

The proposals received, which are summarized below, address multiple Age-Friendly Domains—Transportation, Respect & Social Inclusion, Civic Participation & Employment, and, Social Participation.

The recommendation at this date is to award six (6) grants with this final cycle of 2025. One is for a new, start-up Age-Friendly Community—Jefferson Township. The others are Phase 2 grants to help communities to develop and implement Age-Friendly action plans.

Please be aware that not all grant applications received can be honored. Also, some recommendations are for less than requested. This results from a combination of limited, remaining grant funds from the Del Mar Health Fund, and, items requested that are not a clear fit for Age-Friendly.

Finally, as MVRPC and TDF prepare for 2026, the grant process will be reviewed and improved for the benefit of all Age-Friendly Communities.

Recommendations for approval in this cycle are as follows:

### City of Kettering

#### **Age-Friendly Domains: *Outdoor Spaces & Buildings; Health Services; Social Participation; Respect & Social Inclusion***

This proposal (is for) a fully subsidized, cross-community, Age-Friendly softball league for 65 and older. The program encourages seniors to stay active, enjoy outdoor recreation and build social connections in a friendly, supportive environment. The Kettering PRCA Department will collaborate with neighboring MVAFN communities. Games will take place at Delco Park, providing a central, accessible location for participants and spectators.

*MVRPC/TDF: The City of Kettering Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts accepted a challenge to organize and administer a softball pilot program **for all of the MVAFN communities**. Participation in the program will be at no charge to the participants. It is hoped that each of the Age-Friendly Communities in the Miami Valley will field a team, or will direct individuals, to the program.*

## **City of Brookville**

### **Age-Friendly Domains: *Health Services; Respect and Social Inclusion; Social Participation***

(Brookville is) seeking grant support to enhance its age-friendly programs at the Senior Center. The funds requested will provide an engineer to evaluate an intersection for safer crossings for older residents to cross for easier, safer access to local businesses, a dedicated cell phone to coordinate grocery assistance and Lunch and Learn communications, as well as supplemental funds to support Lunch and Learn sessions and transportation (gas) for the grocery delivery program. ...*(A)*Also requesting funding for a secure cabinet to store board and card games, puzzles, as well as books for a book swap program, a weatherproof storage building for donated mobility equipment (wheelchairs, walkers, etc.) and a qualified instructor to lead senior-friendly exercise classes such as chair yoga.

*MVRPC/TDF: The City of Brookville has enthusiastically added services and amenities in 2025 to become Age-Friendly. The city was awarded two grants earlier this year totaling \$25,000.*

*The recommendation is to award grant funds for "...Lunch and Learn...secure cabinet...and qualified instructor..." that will directly support the expansion and improvement of the City's lunch and learn program, and wellness/fitness programs for older adults.*

**Total Amount Requested: \$20,000**

**Total Project Budget: \$20,000**

**Amount Awarded: \$3,200**

## **Village of Yellow Springs/Yellow Springs Senior Citizens, Inc.**

### **Age-Friendly Domains: *Transportation; Social Participation; Outdoor Spaces; Respect & Social Inclusion***

The Village of Yellow Springs recognizes a great opportunity to action the Livable & Age-Friendly Communities goals by obtaining a "trishaw" to facilitate Cycling Without Age in our region. The YS Senior Center and Friends Care Retirement Center are proximate to the Little Miami Scenic Trail, making this an ideal initiative to pilot in Yellow Springs and Miami Township. This project is a good fit given Yellow Springs proximity to the bike trail.

Notably, the Senior Center has an excellent "sign-up" system that can be utilized to schedule the rides for individuals residing locally and regionally. This project will encourage efforts to coordinate and collaborate on these activities across the Miami Valley.

*MVRPC/TDF: The Village of Yellow Springs/Y.S.Senior Citizens collaborative is the oldest Age-Friendly Community in the Miami Valley Network. Yellow Springs Age-Friendly was awarded a grant earlier this year totaling \$10,500. The TriShaw is akin to the "OPair" cycle funded by the Del Mar Health Fund—Age-Friendly grant in July 2025 for the City of Kettering.*

**Total Amount Requested: \$13,100**

**Total Project Budget: \$15,600**

**Amount Awarded: \$13,100**

## City of Bellbrook

**Age-Friendly Domains: *Social Participation; Health Services; Respect & Inclusion; Outdoor Spaces & buildings.***

The City of Bellbrook plans a Senior Health Fair & Senior Walk Series. The City will collaborate with Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Park District, Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Senior Center, the Senior Resource Connection, Greene County Council on Aging and others. The concept was born from hearing the success stories from other Coalition of Age-Friendly Communities—Ohio (CAFCO) in August.

*MVRPC/TDF: This is the initial step for Bellbrook after completing their Action Plan earlier this year. Of note is the involvement with several other service providers, making this a truly collaborative, community event.*

**Total Amount Requested: \$5000**

**Total Project Budget: \$5000**

**Amount Awarded: \$5000**

## Miami County

**Age-Friendly Domains: *Transportation; Social Participation***

Members of the Miami County Age-Friendly Advisory Council wish to specifically focus on enhancing transportation and Social Participation domains of the county's Action Plan. The request for funds, therefore, are to be used to reduce public transportation costs through a subrecipient grant with Miami County Transit; and, to provide membership fee support for older adults wishing to join one of three county senior centers.

The initiative aims to overcome mobility barriers, encourage meaningful social interaction, and preserve the independence and dignity of older adults.

*MVRPC/TDF: Unlike most grant requests, this is a **County-wide program** versus a single township or city. Also, this is the first grant request by Miami County, and their initial step of the action plan.*

**Total Amount Requested: \$20,000**

**Total Project Budget: \$20,000**

**Amount Awarded: \$20,000**

## Jefferson Township

**Phase One—Needs Assessment**

The Township plans to conduct surveys, listening sessions, and asset mapping focused on all eight (8) Age-Friendly Domains. They will pursue special outreach to older adults, low-income households, and underserved residents. Results will inform the long-term Age-Friendly Action Plan. The effort reflects the vision of a township that supports residents at every stage of life.

*MVRPC/TDF: Jefferson Township has just enrolled in the AARP Age-Friendly Community program. As such, the Township is eligible for a grant to conduct a needs assessment among their older adults, and those who are planning to age.*

**WHEREAS**, through the support of the Del Mar Encore Fellowship, MVRPC provides technical assistance to MVRPC member communities that are interested in pursuing Age Friendly grants; and,

**WHEREAS**, the MVRPC Institute Steering Committee voted during their meeting on Friday, October 31, 2025 to recommend the third round of 2025 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grants be awarded to the MVRPC member communities,

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby concurs with the Institute Steering Committee recommendations to award the third round of 2025 Livable, Age-Friendly Communities Grant as shown in the attached.





### Health Environment Assessment Equity Analysis

August 2022

There are many things that impact how well and how long we live. Beyond medical care, our health and well-being are influenced by everything from education to the environment we live in. Collectively, these factors are called Social Determinants of Health (SDOH). SDOH are defined as "conditions in the environments in which people are born, live, learn, work, play, and age that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-of-life outcomes and risks."

The Health Environment Assessment, the first product of the PLAN4Health - Miami Valley Initiative, used a SDOH model to examine conditions related to social, behavioral, built, and planning environments in the Region.

The SDOH Index Map, built from 23 indicators across 5 domains from the Health Environment Assessment, established a comprehensive baseline of existing conditions in the Miami Valley Region at the neighborhood level.

### Built Environment Assessment Equity Analysis

March 2023

The environments where we live, work, and play impact our health and well-being. Planning shapes our communities and planning for healthy communities is an effective way to achieve better health outcomes and promote quality of life.

Health communities are made up of more than just medical offices and hospitals; a healthy community is one where all individuals have access to healthy built, social, economic, and natural environments that give them the opportunity to live to their fullest potential regardless of their race, ethnicity, gender, income, age, abilities, or other socially defined circumstances. (1)

Creating communities where healthy choices are easy options and the built environment is conducive to active living is a means by which planning can effectively impact the health and well-being of the Region's residents. Active living isn't just about getting in the gym or going for a run. Active living is a way of life that integrates physical activity into everyday routines, such as walking to the store or taking to work or school.

The Built Environment Assessment, the newest project from the PLAN4Health - Miami Valley Initiative, examined many more physical environmental conditions for their ability to support active living. The Active Community Index (ACI) was developed for the purpose of establishing a comprehensive baseline of how communities are doing in terms of active living. As such, the ACI incorporates three (3) domains that influence active living: Land-Use, Public/Active Transportation, and Active Infrastructure.

## **MVRPC Represented at Community Engagement Focused Conferences**

As a part of his role as Vice President of the National Association of Regional Councils and Chairperson of the Executive Directors Council, Brian attended the Keystone International Forum on Collaboration Based Siting in Denver, CO from September 8 – 10, 2025. Through his attendance, Brian provided local government and regional council focused comments for regional and public dialogue that could involve any large scale public infrastructure project such as a new airport, new power generation or waste disposal facilities, a new factory, or new landfill. The Keystone team received a Department of Energy grant awarded to document community engagement approaches. In addition to regional councils, attendees included indigenous communities, academia, community-minded organizations such as Sierra Club, National Governors Association, and numerous environmental and energy focused organizations.

In July, the Ohio Association of Regional Councils (OARC) representing regional Councils in Ohio partnered with the Keystone center to discuss the effects of mis-/dis- information on public process in a half-day workshop on information, trust, and collaboration. In this era oof 24 hour news and social media, the workshop focused on mitigating negative impacts of misinformation and disinformation on collaboration and planning. In any future project's development process, mis- and disinformation would be potentially influential or challenging. This workshop used local case studies to help participants understand the nature of mis- and disinformation as well as strategies for countering it. Discussions involved the roles of AI and news media bias.

Lastly, in October, the Greater Portland Council of Governments (GPCOG) welcomed regional leaders to Portland, Maine for the 2025 NARC Executive Directors Conference. Set against the backdrop of Portland's scenic waterfront, members gathered to explore solutions to pressing regional priorities. The conference is one of three conferences hosted annually by the National Association of Regional Councils that provide information sharing and networking opportunities for staff and board members for regional councils. This same conference was hosted by MVRPC here in Dayton last year. Topics included transportation, artificial Intelligence, housing, and resiliency emphasizing the vital role regional councils play in planning for Regions.

MVRPC staff, along with our partners, recently presented at multiple national and regional conferences on strategies and tools that support resilience ensuring our communities remain safe and vibrant as well as foster smart growth and development. ## MVRPC Hosts the Second Youth Group Housing Workshop

MVRPC hosted the second informative workshop on the topic of Youth Group Housing on Tuesday, September 30 at the Montgomery County Business Solutions Center. The goal of this workshop was for participants to gain a better understanding of impacts Group Housing for Youth concentration bring to communities and learn about proactive approaches our community leaders are taking to help manage youth group home conditions, while supporting some of the most vulnerable in our communities.



A total of 47 attendees representing City, Township, and County levels of government in fields of law enforcement, emergency responders, children's services, and planning turned out. In addition, several group home operators and the head of the group homes association attended the workshop.

The workshop included Ms. Kathryn Youra Polk of MVRPC demonstrating a Youth Group Housing [mapping application](#) MVRPC developed to illustrate the high level of youth group housing concentration in Montgomery County. Following the presentation, Ms. Shannon Meadows, Harrison Township Administrator, moderated the panel discussion of first responders that included Mr. Brad French, Mr. Greg Patterson, and Mr. Aaron Primm from the City of Dayton and Mr. Kevin Monroe and Deputy Javan Richardson from Harrison Township. The panel discussion centered around sharing their experiences, insights, and relationships interacting with youth group housing in their communities. ## MVRPC Hosts Local Workshops to Advance Active Living

MVRPC As part of the PLAN4Health – Miami Valley Initiative, MVRPC has worked with local partners to host three workshops intended to advance active living within their local communities.

In support of Miami County Public Health’s Healthy Eating and Active Living (HEAL) Grant, MVRPC conducted a workshop in August to explore active living in the Piqua area. In September, staff worked with Miami Township, Montgomery County, to hold a workshop that focused on active living opportunities in the northern part of the township. In October, staff worked with Washington Township, Montgomery County, to highlight active living assets and opportunities.

At each workshop, MVRPC staff presented on the topic of active living and led participants through an interactive environmental scan aimed at evaluating areas for active living deficiencies and identification of policy, program, or project level solutions to improve built environment conditions.

MVRPC’s PLAN4Health – Miami Valley Initiative was launched in the Spring of 2021 to explore how planning can impact health outcomes. The PLAN4Health - Miami Valley Initiative is a multi-year effort with a focus on projects and programs intended to:

- Promote and advocate for “Health in All Plans and Policies”
- Convene and engage partners to improve conditions that are known to be key determinants of health
- Advance planning efforts aimed at creating conditions for healthy people and communities
