




General Crash Trend







High-Crash Location Selection Process


- Regional road network was divided into 1,065 segments & 317 intersections
- Local roads not included


High-Crash Location Selection Process

- Cut-off for Consideration:
 - For Segments
 - Minimum of 9 crashes in 3 years OR have a sum of two or more fatalities and/or serious injuries
 - 205 segments prioritized
 - For Intersections
 - Minimum of 7 crashes in 3 years OR have one or more fatalities and/or serious injuries
 - 55 intersections prioritized

High-Crash Location Selection Process

- Ranked by summed point total taking into account points for:
 - □ Crash Rate
 - □ Crash Density (Segments) or Frequency (Intersections)
 - □ Relative Severity Index (RSI)
 - Equivalent Property Damage Only (EPDO)
 - Point values came from ODOT
- Followed by RSI
 - □ Crashes where severe and/or fatal crashes occurred were prioritized







Vulnerable Populations and Populations with Limited English Proficiency

Overview

- MVRPC conducts assessments of vulnerable populations and populations with LEP
- The goal is to ensure environmental justice and equity is at the forefront of analysis
- Analysis done through qualitative and quantitative means with GIS data and Census data

Data is from 2016-2020 ACS and 2020 Census

What is Environmental Justice and Equity?

"The fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies. Fair treatments means that no group of people, including racial, ethnic, or socio-economic group should bear a disproportionate share of the negative environmental consequences resulting industrial, municipal, and commercial operations or the execution of federal, state, local, and tribal programs and policies. (U.S. EPA, Office *Environmental Justice)*

Disproportionate Impacts and Burdens


- The use of EJ in transportation planning ensures no one group bears the disproportionate impacts or burdens of projects

- Provides equal access to meaningful involvement for all communities so they may make informed decisions

















Populations with Limited English Proficiency

- A person with Limited English Proficiency is one who does not speak English as their primary language and who has a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English
- The purpose of this analysis is to provide a snapshot of the distribution of LEP persons within the Region
- In compliance with Executive Order 13166: Improving Access to Service for Persons with Limited English Proficiency


LEP Populations Within the Region



- Individuals with limited English proficiency are encouraged to request translators. Translating efforts are focused on Spanish.








