I. INTRODUCTION

Chairperson, Stephanie Goff called the meeting to order. Roll call was taken.

II. APPROVAL OF July 16, 2020 MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Hankins made a motion to approve minutes. Mr. Cron seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

III. Public Comment Period on Action Items

None

IV. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Recommended Adoption of Amendment to MVRPC's SFY 2021-SFY 2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to the amendment to the SFY 2021-2024 TIP and the numerous project changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He referred to the packet showing the tables broken down by county, as well as the statewide line item project tables. Mr. Arnold stated that staff recommends adoption of this TIP amendment and referred to a resolution on page 15 of the mailout.

Mr. Gruner made a motion to recommend forwarding to the Board for adoption. Ms. Swinger seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Recommended Approval of FAST Acts Funds Availability Report and Project Solicitation Request

Mr. Arnold referred to the memo on page 17 of the mailout regarding FAST Act Funds availability report and project solicitation request. Mr. Arnold stated that the attached table shows the status of regionally controlled federal transportation funds over the next six-year period. The report shows that staff anticipates a short-range fund balance of \$14.1 million (\$12.6M STP and \$1.5M TA funds) which is slightly more than a full years allocation for the region.

Mr. Arnold stated that based upon the attached financial report, staff will formally request MVRPC Board authorization to solicit member jurisdictions for new projects.

Ms. Swinger made a motion to forward the authorization to the Board. Mr. O'Connor seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

C. Recommended Approval of Updates to the STP-CMAQ-TA Policies and Procedures

Mr. Arnold referred to the memo on page 21 of the mailout requesting that the Board approve the updated policies and procedures for the Surface Transportation Program (STP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) and Transportation Alternatives (TA) funds.

Mr. Arnold stated that Ohio's large MPO's no longer have direct control over CMAQ funds. A Statewide CMAQ Committee is in place and it has been determined that a CMAQ project solicitation will take place on a biennial bases. As such, the CMAQ project solicitation will be included this year. Additionally, it has been determined that due to the lack of available funding in earlier fiscal years, the STP Resurfacing Program set aside will be suspended for the current solicitation round.

Mr. Arnold stated that staff recommends approval of the updated MVRPC policies and procedures for the Surface Transportation Program (STP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) and Transportation Alternatives (TA) funds.

Mr. Hankins made a motion to forward the resolution to the Board for approval on page 49 of the mailout accepting the updated policy and procedures for STP-CMAQ-TA program. Mr. Nick Smith seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

D. Recommended Approval of MVRPC TRAC Projects for CY2020

Mr. Daniel requested approval of MVRPC TRAC Projects for CY2020. Mr. Daniel referenced the Memo on page 51 of the mailout, stating that in order to provide the TRAC a project priority list, the MVRPC Board adopted its *Policies and Procedures for Considering Major New Capacity Projects* (available at www.mvrpc.org) and MVRPC staff has completed its review of the single CY2020 TRAC Project submitted this year in accordance with the Policy.

Mr. Daniel mentioned since this is an existing TRAC project, MVRPC staff is forwarding this project to the MVRPC TAC and Board of Directors as a priority project for support prior to submittal to the TRAC.

Mr. Daniel asked for approval of the resolution on page 55 of the mailout, *Approving the MVRPC Priorities for Major New Capacity Project for CY2020*.

Mr. Conway made a motion to forward the resolution for Board approval. Ms. Swinger seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

V. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan – Project Submission Deadline

Ms. Parikh announced that the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan is updated every five years and is prepared by MVRPC in cooperation with local and state officials, and other coordinating agencies.

Ms. Parikh mentioned that the deadline to submit project information is August 28th.

Ms. Parikh noted that if any of the jurisdictions have not updated their project information to please go to the plan website for the necessary forms.

VI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Martin greeted the committee and commented on the great weather and how everyone seems to be taking advantage of the weather to work on projects.

Mr. Martin stated that on August 19th, that he was joined by Board Chair, Chris Mucher, Teresa and Stacy at the 9/11 Memorial in Beavercreek to surprise Board member Woodrow (Woody) Stroud with the Annual Steward Award. Mr. Martin stated that a write up will be in the digital ED's Update and a video presentation will be made at the Board meeting.

Mr. Martin reviewed the ED's Update:

- Mr. Martin welcomed Carlton Eley as the new Regional Equity Manager. Mr. Martin said that Mr. Eley started August 3rd and has been busy. Mr. Martin stated that if anyone would like to speak with Mr. Eley to please feel free to contact him, his contact information is on the MVRPC website.
- Mr. Martin reminded everyone about the importance of the 2020 Census and mentioned we
 do everything we can to make sure everyone is counted. Mr. Martin stated that because of
 the COVID-19 pandemic, the Census Bureau has extended its operations, allowing
 residents to self-respond by filling out the Census form through September 30, 2020.
- Mr. Martin stated that if anyone has questions regarding the Electric Vehicle Charging Station Funding, to contact Matt Lindsay.
- Mr. Martin stated that the Revised Final Draft of the Greater Miami Valley Region Transportation Plan (GRMI) is available at www.mvrpc/grmi.
- Mr. Martin announced that the States' long-range transportation plan, Access Ohio 2045 is nearing completion. The plan can be reviewed at: Access.Ohio.gov.

Mr. Martin opened the floor for questions. No one had any questions, Mr. Martin thanked everyone for their attendance today.

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning process for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, all Federally funded transit and highway improvements within Greene, Miami and Montgomery County must be included in the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) prior to the expenditure of Federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 7, 2020; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP amendment; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

WHEREAS, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #4** to the <u>SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program</u> as shown on the attached TIP Tables.

Resolution Reaffirming the Goals and Objectives of the current Transportation Plan.

MVRPC is in the process of updating the Long Range Transportation Plan. The new Plan Update is expected to be completed by May 2021.

The Long Range Transportation Plan is a long-range (20+year) strategy and capital improvement program developed to guide the effective investment of public funds in multi modal transportation facilities. The plan is updated every 5 years, and may be amended as a result of changes in projected Federal, State and local funding, major improvement studies, Congestion Management Process plans, interchange justification studies, and environmental impact studies. The Plan provides the context from which the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), a short-range capital improvement program for implementing highway, transit, and bikeway projects, is drawn.

August 19th Public Participation Meeting Summary

MVRPC held a public participation meeting to present the inputs and assumptions behind the Transportation Plan update and solicit public input. The meeting was held virtually via zoom from 5 to 6 pm and following the presentation staff answered participant questions.

Outlined below is a recap of public outreach efforts to promote the meeting:

- Printing public notices in the Dayton Daily News and ¼ page ads in La Mega Nota (English and Spanish) and Dayton Weekly, a minority focus newspaper, announcing the meeting.
- Submitting press releases to all local newspapers, television and radio stations approximately 89 media outlets.
- Sending e-mails/letters to individuals and agencies who have requested to be notified about public participation meetings as well as additional agencies/interested parties identified in the FAST Act legislation—over 700 individuals/agencies.
- Sending letters and promotional posters to all the public libraries in Montgomery, Greene and Miami Counties.
- Displaying promotional posters in English and Spanish at the Greater Dayton Regional Transit Authority hubs.
- E-mailing promotional poster to Miami County Transit and Greene CATS.
- E-mailing promotional posters (English and Spanish versions) to the Latino Connection for distribution.

- Announcing the meeting on the MVRPC's website.
- Promoting the meeting using Twitter and Facebook, including 3 boosted posts.
- Posting the information, which was to be presented at the meeting, on plan2050.mvrpc.org along with an online comment card.

A total of 11 people attended the meeting and participants were encouraged to give their comments on the 2050 Plan update through the online comment card. Comments received can be seen in the attachment.

MVRPC also conducted a survey to gauge the Region's satisfaction with the availability and condition of the existing transportation infrastructure and to set priorities for the future. At the end of the survey, respondents were also given the opportunity to submit comments. The results can be seen in the attachment.

Over the next few months staff will present and ask you to review and/or adopt various information and documentation related to the Plan update. Today, staff is asking you to reaffirm the goals and objectives of the Long Range Transportation Plan. The current goals and objectives continue to reflect federal requirements and regional priorities.

Survey Comments

Thanks for all you do. The Third St bridge project will support the Wright-Dunbar neighborhood and serve as the gateway into the National Park. Roads and sidewalks in Greater West Dayton continue to deteriorate. Please consider projects at Abbey & West Third, and Abbey & US 35 to support the Dayton Metro Library and National Park at that site.

Being a large university in the eastern part of the MVRPC area, the availability of transit for our students to get to and from campus is really limited. There should be fixed routes with Greene CATS through our community. The sidewalks in town are also in very poor condition and not level, making it difficult for handicap individuals to use.

The rail road bridges are a travesty and need to be repaired and replaced. They look terrible, are a safety hazard with falling debris and downgrade every community they travers. The rail road is impossible to work with and they need to be more proactive and responsible in this area.

Most frequent problem is trash in the alley in older neighborhood, between N. Main and Riverside Dr. Dayton Canoe Club area. Alley sometimes impassable due to trash including large items such as tires, mattresses, TVs.

I have cut and removed tree limbs to improve passage and safety, hauled away at my own expense other large junk, in my own truck.

Regional bikeways need more neighborhood connections and easily-identifiable, safe transitions between on-street infrastructure and bikeways. Transit options need to be more frequent. Pedestrian options need to exist, especially connecting transit to neighborhoods and commercial areas, and be well-lit.

Please address entering onto SR 4 from Adams Rd and Bath Rd. Speed limit on Rte 4 is 60, but during busy times drivers are mostly going closer to 70, some faster, and it's difficult to safely get on the highway with no acceleration lanes available. Lowering the speed limit for at grade intersections on 4 would likely not change driver behavior.

Safety for bicycles and pedestrians should be the number one priority for our future.


Not surprising most, necessities are available by car, but the percentages from for other modes. I think it would be important to look at moving the needle on other modes in neighbors with higher percentages of zero car households.

Website Comment Form

I would like to see infrastructure in place that facilitates various road users sharing the same facilities. Continued separation of cyclists and motorists will only make them less tolerant of each other. Using sharrow markings with or without Bike May Use Full Lane signage is inexpensive and would evoke growth of respect and safety among these types of road users. Separate, adjacent facilities create problems at intersections and also reduce liability protection of cyclists (having less room to navigate hazards causing them to choose to ride through a hazard or change lanes without sufficient time to yield the right if way, compromising liability protection). We should be building things that have road users increase respect for each other and not reduce it. Separate, adjacent facilities promote the belief that different road users have to be separated. A problem is that many motorists believe this and many cyclists as well. Neither is thinking about liability issues, that is, until an issue occurs. Sharrows would say cyclists belong here and cyclists, please ride here; motorists and cyclists are effectively taught to coexist. This would reduce harassment of cyclists by motorists, creating a more friendly cycling and motoring environment. Separation is not the answer; it will only fan the flames on both sides. (If the separation is like in Holland, with completely separate roadways, that is fine for, unlike separate but adjacent facilities, it does not cause cross-path issues at intersections (since they are completely separate intersections).





Subject: FY2022 Dayton Development Coalition's Priority Development and Advocacy

Committee (PDAC) Process

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is working with other organizations throughout the Miami Valley to identify projects that may be eligible for federal and state funding. We will be working with the Dayton Regional PDAC, which has developed a process to evaluate projects and establish a list of regional priorities and recommended projects that aid the community in speaking with one voice when pursuing funding opportunities. Solicitation for new projects will start September 28th, and through a committee decision, the top projects will be forwarded on to pursue funding opportunities.

The purpose of this process is to establish a list of projects which benefit the Miami Valley to be submitted as requests for funding. The intent of this process is to present the list in a timely fashion in a format that is useful and contains projects that are mature and potentially eligible for funding.

MVRPC is the lead agency for review and ranking of Transportation and Government Services projects. Transportation projects include surface, air, rail, transit, and pedestrian transportation-related projects. Government Services projects include criminal justice, first responders, community and neighborhood infrastructure, and K-12 education projects. The Transportation and Government Services review panel will evaluate proposed projects by the importance of the project and by the impact it will have in the Region. The list of recommended priorities will then be sent to the MVRPC Board of Directors for final review and adoption followed by submittal to the Dayton Regional PDAC. The schedule of the PDAC process is included on the following page.






