WORKFORCE DATASET

The Dayton Development Coalition (DDC) has access to and provides a variety of regional economic data for 14 counties and beyond. MVRPC, in partnership with the DDC, used county-level data available through EMSI including data representing the entire Warren County for this Workforce Regional Profile, unless noted otherwise.

Our 5+ County Region includes Darke, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, Preble, and northern Warren

This Workforce Regional Profile, however, included the entire Warren County due to data availability.

Our Region's workforce is made up of people with diverse occupations. Influenced by the state and national economy, the Region has experienced dynamic occupational growth and decline over the last 12 years.

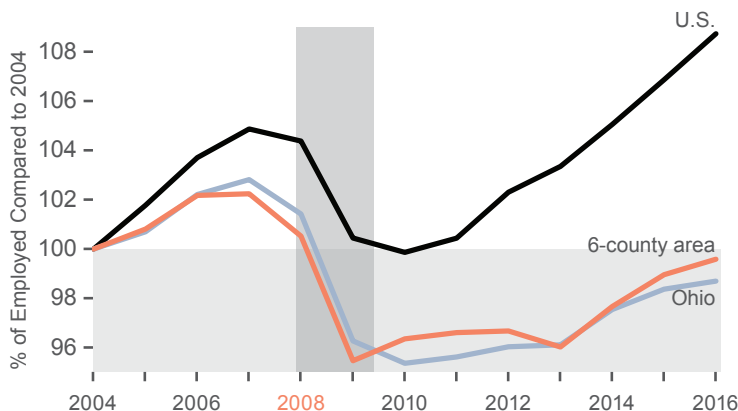

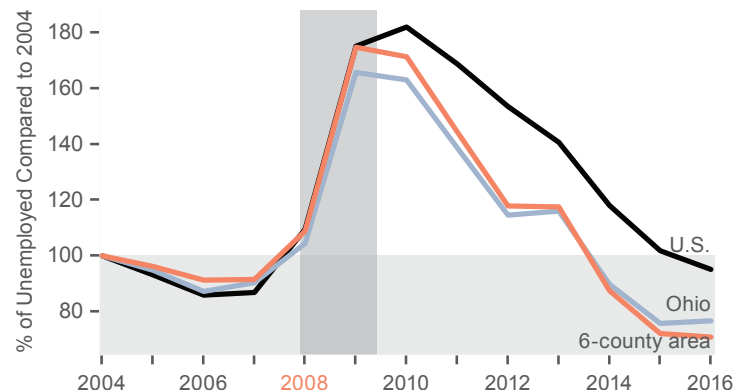

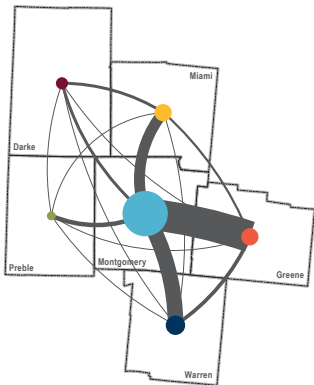
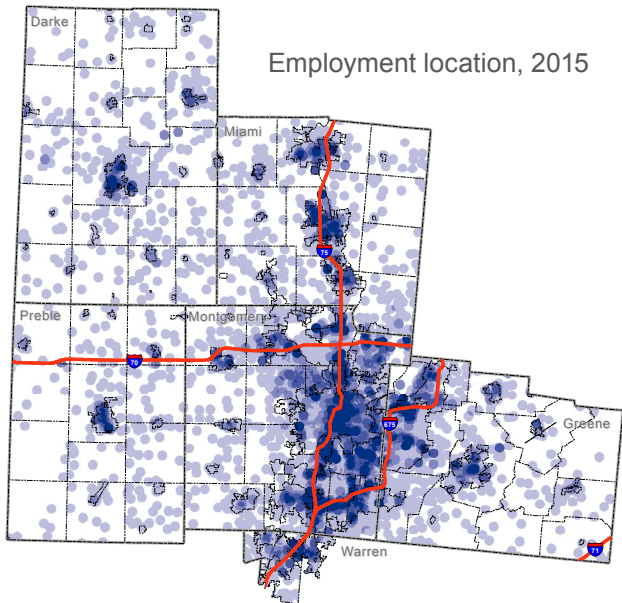


Unemployment Index



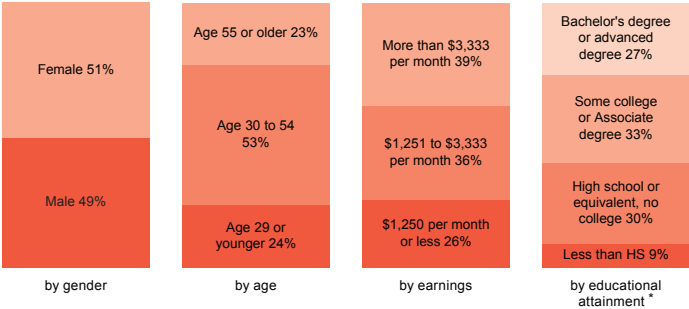
People of diverse backgrounds and characteristics live and work in the Region.

Jobs in the Region are clustered in eastern Montgomery County, around interstates, and in county seats.

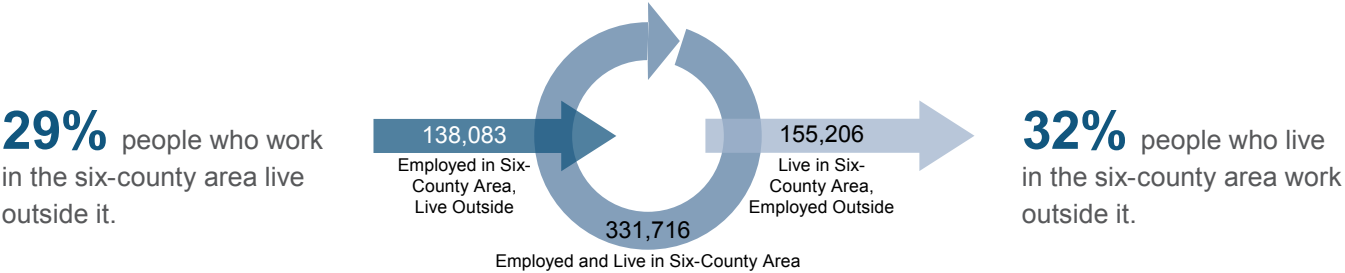


Our Region's diverse workforce travels all around the six-county area to reach their workplace.

Workforce Characteristics

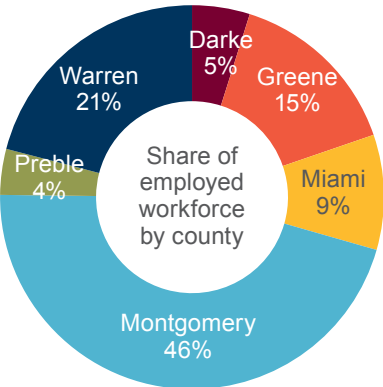


About a third of our residents leave the six-county area for work, but nearly as many come to work in our area from outside.

Montgomery County has the largest workforce in the Region, but it also has the highest unemployment rate. Greene County has the highest median hourly earnings of \$18.02.

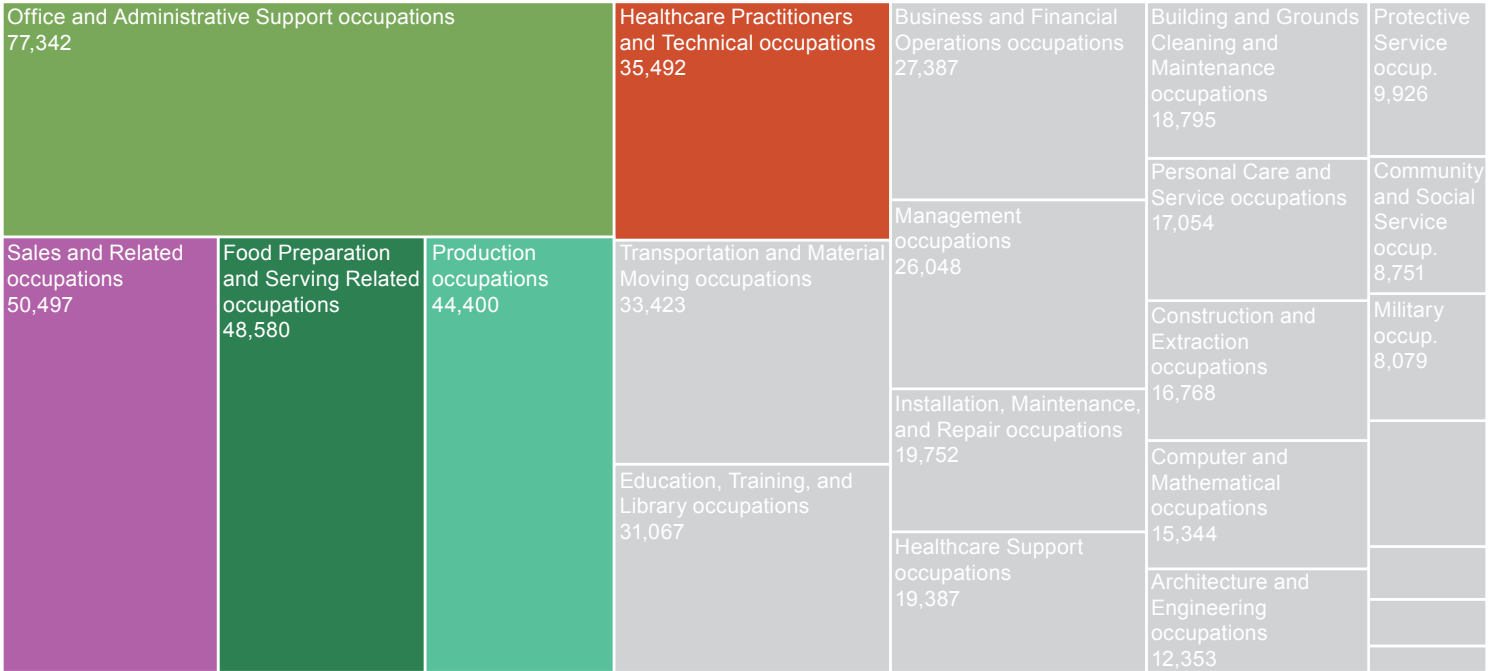

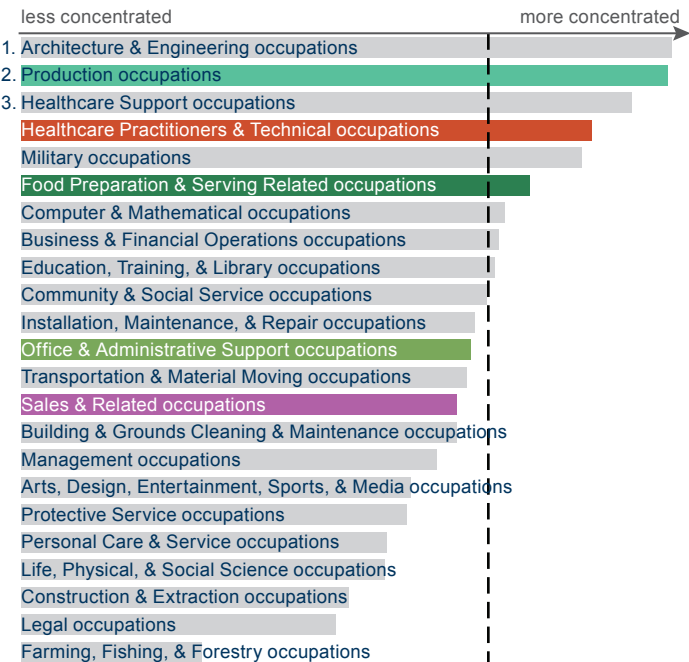

Our area’s workforce is dominated by office, sales, food preparation, production, and healthcare occupations.

The largest occupational groups are **office**, **sales**, **food preparation**, **production**, and **healthcare practitioners**. Together, they account for **48% of the six-county area’s jobs**.



Our Region has a higher concentration of **architecture & engineering**, **production**, **healthcare support**, **healthcare practitioners**, and **military occupations** when compared to the U.S. as a whole.



Note: The chart illustrates location quotient (LQ), indicating which occupational groups in the Region are more or less concentrated than the U.S. as a whole.



20% of the unemployed previously worked in Construction and Extraction occupations, compared to 11% nationally.



12% of the unemployed previously worked in Building and Grounds Cleaning and Maintenance occupations, compared to 7% nationally.



8% of the unemployed previously worked in Sales and Related occupations, compared to 10% nationally.



7% of the unemployed previously worked in Office and Administrative Support occupations, compared to 10% nationally.



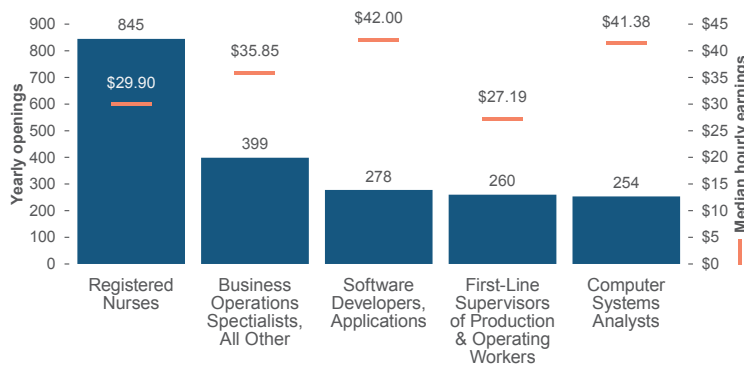
5% of the unemployed previously worked in Food Preparation and Serving Related occupations, compared to 8% nationally.

Individual counties have varying degrees of occupational mix but the growth trends by occupation have been uneven.

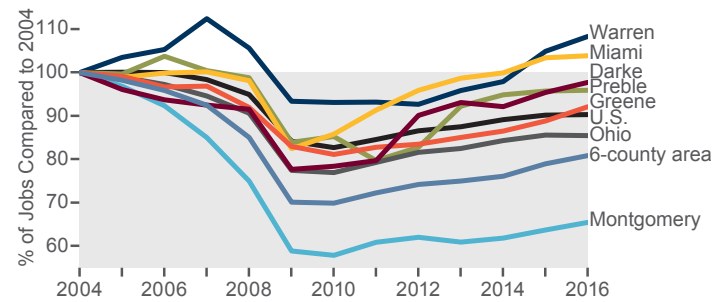
Each county has a similar mix of occupational groups: **office and administration**, **sales**, **food preparation**, **production**, and **healthcare practitioners**.

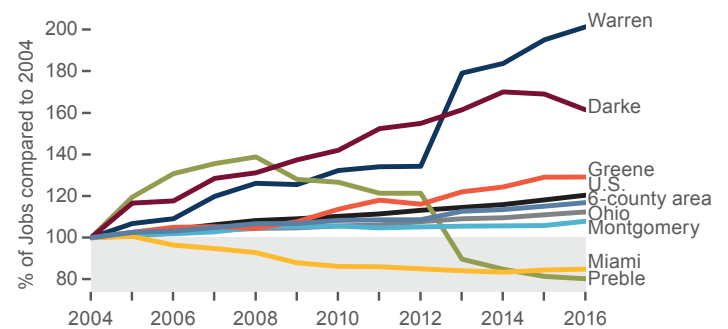
Our Region has several occupations with a bright outlook. These five occupations pay well, are experiencing growth, and have hundreds of annual openings.



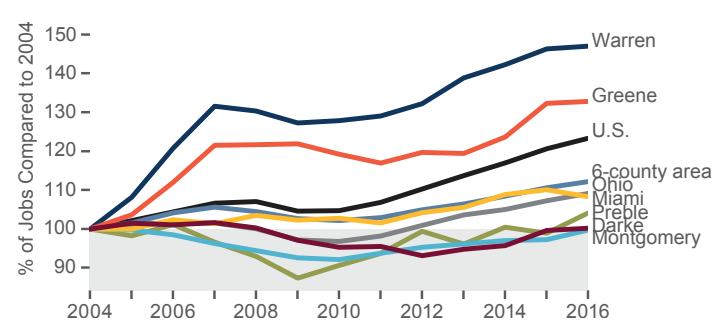
Production Occupations Index
