- Tool Kit developed to support preservation and enhancement of the valuable ecosystem services that benefit the residents of the Region.



Air Quality

- Issues: Need to address greenhouse gases
- Low Hanging Fruit: Share MVRPC's Air Pollution Advisories with your residents
- Stretch Goal: Add electric vehicles to community fleet, and install public EV charging





Energy

 Issues: Need to reduce (eventually eliminate) fossil fuel use.



- Low Hanging Fruit: Require the purchase of EnergyStar equipment for all municipal procurements
- Stretch Goal: Offer renewable energy through community aggregation



Food

 Issues: Hunger and food waste exist side-by-side in our community



- Low Hanging Fruit: Host gardening and composting classes for your residents
- Stretch Goal: Allow urban farming, front yard gardens and small livestock uses



Green Building & Redevelopment

 Issues: How to include existing buildings in the new energy economy



- Low Hanging Fruit: Recognize LEED certified buildings in your community
- Stretch Goal: Train staff to provide technical assistance about Green Building



Land Use & Development

• **Issues**: Sprawling development with steady or declining population



- Low Hanging Fruit: Hold a "Better Block" demonstration project
- Stretch Goal: Update zoning code with a focus toward sustainability; consider Form-Based Code



Solid Waste

 Issues: Recycling programs are becoming more complicated and expensive



- Low Hanging Fruit: Host swap meet/Free-cycle style events
- Stretch Goal: Require commercial and multi-unit dwelling recycling. Adopt "Payas-you-Throw" solid waste approach.



Transportation

 Issues: Auto centric transportation doesn't provide mobility for all



- Low Hanging Fruit: Partner with MVRPC for walking audits in your community
- Stretch Goal: Adopt an Active Transportation Plan that improves walking, biking and transit access



Trees, Native Species & Land Management

 Issues: Urban tree canopy is below desirable levels; invasive pests and plants



- Low Hanging Fruit: Conduct a community tree inventory
- Stretch Goal: develop and fund a community tree planting program



Water Quality

• **Issues**: Climate change is altering rain patterns, frequency, severity



- Low Hanging Fruit: Promote use of tap water over bottled water
- Stretch Goal: Provide incentives for private property owners to install green infrastructure






